—Fort Madison Democrat: Court house officials were at work today transferring the \$50,000 worth of county bridge fund bonds to the purchasers, finishing up the work their issuance has been causing for some time past. The money secured by the sale will be sufficient to cover the bridge debt with the exception of a few minor warrants yet outstanding. For a time some questioned the advisability of assuming the bonds while the supervisor qualification controversy was still hanging fire, thinking that perhaps the dispute might affect the validity of the issue. That there be no chance of a question of the value of the bonds the opinions of the county attorney, by E. C. Weber, deputy, concurred in by D. F. Miller of Keokuk and also the opinion of Wood and Oakley, the Chicago bond experts testifying as to the lawfulness of the issue accompanying the bonds.

**WILL W. J. SHAW AND HIS WIFE, the latest globe trotters to pass this territory, be able to complete their journey around the world on foot without violating the rules imposed upon them, was the question which many Keokuk people pondered over last night as the couple arrived in Keokuk from Montrose and plodded slowly down Main street, about 7 o'clock. And many were skeptical.**

Shaw and his wife are both of diminutive size and their appearance rather denies their ability to perform the gigantic task which they have undertaken under the guise of fame and fortune. If they reach the end of their journey before September 24, 1913, they win a wager of \$12,000.

Shaw himself seems to be standing the trip thus far very well, but his wife is laboring under difficulties. Neither are more than five feet in height. Mrs. Shaw sprained an ankle in Burlington and was forced to remain there three days recovering. Her ankle is not yet strong and she hobbled along slowly. Monday they were in Fort Madison and a shoeman there donated a pair of high shoes, which she is now wearing.

Following their usual manner of registration the postmark and signatures of the mayor and justice of the peace were also entered in a book which Shaw carries.

According to the statements of the travelers and the newspaper clippings which they carry with them, they left New York in March and are to return by September 24, 1913. They

**MERCHANTS WIN IN STAMP CASE**

Writ of Injunction Denied Sperry & Hutchinson By Judge McPherson.

By the act of Judge Smith McPherson of the United States district court the Ottumwa Retail Merchants association wins a victory for the time being over the Sperry & Hutchinson trading stamp company in the matter of a temporary injunction and restraining order against the association before Judge McPherson. It will be remembered that some time ago when the controversy arose between the merchants of Ottumwa, some of whom had taken up the S. & H. trading stamps in opposition to the Merchants' association's wishes, the latter was prevented from influencing such of the merchants as it could from giving up

the trading stamp contract by the writ of temporary injunction asked for in the federal court. The following was received by T. J. Smith, attorney for the Retail Merchants' association from Judge Smith McPherson:

"This case having been heretofore submitted to the court on the pleadings and affidavits and proofs, and the case having been fully argued by the counsel, was taken by the court under advisement.

"Now at this time the court being fully advised in the premises, vacates the restraining order issued May 9, 1910. The court denies the application for a temporary writ of injunction herein. To each, all and every one of which the complainant at the time in open court excepts.

"It is further ordered that complainant plead to the answer herein by filing a general replication or other pleadings, as complainant may be advised, to get the issues made up, after which the evidence will be taken under and pursuant to the general rules in equity.

"Done in open court this August 1, 1910.

"Smith McPherson, Judge."
