—Des Moines Evening Tribune: A. L. Urlick, president of the Iowa Federation of Labor, returned today from Ottumwa, where he has been attempting to settle the strike recently declared by the telephone exchange girls employed by the Ottumwa Telephone company. According to Mr. Urlick's statement, the prospects of an early settlement of the difficulty are poor. The twenty-seven striking girls have been refused their demand for a closed shop and have declared their determination to fight the telephone company to the last ditch. They have been assured of help by the Ottumwa Trades Assembly and probably will receive strike benefits during the time they are idle. It is understood that the telephone company refuses to recognize the girls' union and insists upon an open shop. Mr. Urlick will return to Ottumwa within three or four days to attend another conference of labor officials and company men looking toward a settlement of the difficulty.

**AUTO RACES FOR DONNELSON FAIR**

A New Feature Has Been Added That Will Prove Popular With Both Owners and Spectators.

**KEOKUK CARS ENTERED**

Several Owners From Keokuk Have Signified Intention of Entering and Others are Expected to Follow.

The big attraction this year at the Donnellson fair, September 7 to 9, is to be the auto races, in which several cars from Keokuk will be entered and driven by their owners. This form of amusement is new to this section but should prove a great success, especially with Keokuk motorists, as there is at present great rivalry between the owners of different makes of machines.

The suggestion was made that such a race be featured about ten days ago to the fair management and met with their approval at once, and also with the approval of the auto owners of this section as is shown by the sentiment expressed. Nearly all of the make of cars seen on the streets of Keokuk will have a representative. George Hartel is grooming and caring for an Inter-State forty that he will enter and drive and the Strickler company will enter a Cutting forty which will be driven by Thomas Bowers. Both cars will be stripped of any unnecessary equipment and will be driven to the limit. Bowers has driven in several races. Smith Hamill expects to enter his Chalmers-Detroit, which is a thirty horse power machine. When the races were mentioned to the Erickson-Larson Co, they stated that they would probably enter a Buick.

There are several other cars around the country and in Keokuk that will probably enter. Ft. Madison has several experienced drivers and will be well represented. Atlee, of Madison, has a six-cylinder Olds machine of sixty horse power and there are other fast machines of other makes in that city.

The date of the auto races was not known in the city this morning, but will be set soon. The track on which the races will be held is a half mile in length. On such a course the skill and ability of the driver will count very much. The race will be against time.
