#### Daily Grain Letter.

CHICAGO, Aug. 20.—Wheat—The influence of supposedly bullish foreign situation is not sufficient to overcome bearish domestic conditions. Foreign news is also a little more bearish. European markets are easing off. Russian and Danubian offerings are heavy and shipments will be larger than a week ago. The world's shipments without any very heavy contribution from America will be large. Apparently foreigners loaded up in a speculative way on the crop scare and are now liquidating. Commission houses are heavily long September and the sales are mostly made for elevator interests who will deliver the goods. We look for further liquidation and lower prices. Traders are more influenced by the big receipts and large stocks than anything else. There is little or no outside speculative demand.

Corn—Liquidation which started yesterday bids fair to continue as long as wheat and oats are weak. Receipts are expected to increase as a result of fine outlook for corn in those sections directly tributary to Chicago. We anticipate a continued liquidation of September contracts and more or less of the same sort of selling in May and December. We feel moderately friendly to the new crop futures but can hope for no bull movement with everything else working lower.

Oats—The same influences which have controlled the market for several weeks are still operating. The movement is heavy, stocks are accumulating rapidly and the only demand for the cash article comes from elevator interests who are filling storage space and placing a further burden on the pit. A considerable short interest has been established which may result in some rally.

Provisions—Packers and shorts were moderate buyers. Stocks are small and controlled by packers, who also control pit prices. Product is about a normal basis. We believe that January product, even at its discount, is a sale on the hard spots.

Sample markets—Wheat premiums on 2 red and 2 hard increased as futures decline. There is a good general demand and offerings are lighter. 2 red and 2 hard 1/4c over September. Corn weak 1 to 2c lower. Offerings not large, but demand very poor. Oats heavy 1/4 to 3/4c lower. Receipts are not large, demand shows no improvement. One or two elevator concerns still buying, most houses well filled.
