S. circuit court here. W. C. Maxwell, general traffic manager for the Wabash, was in the city Saturday, visiting with his mother and brothers and sisters. Mr. Maxwell has recently returned from a trip over the Western Pacific and other Gould lines. Miss Cleeta McSurley, the young daughter of J. H. McSurley, a wealthy farmer living two and one-half miles north of Keosauqua, committed suicide by shooting herself with a shotgun. She was a senior in the Keosauqua high school. No cause is assigned for her act. John S. Richardson, a member of the New York Times force, accompanied by his brother, Wm. Richardson, of Quincy, were in the city Friday, visiting their old friend, Alex E. Johnstone, and took occasion to visit the water power site on the Illinois side. Clarence Weisman, at the present time assistant physical director in the East Liberty branch of the Y. M. C. A., at Pittsburg, has been asked to take full charge of a similar department at Troy, N. J. As Weisman is contemplating entering school this fall he has not yet decided as to what course he will pursue. Friends and parishioners of Rev. Geo. C. Williams in this city have received souvenir post cards from that clergyman, who is now with his wife and daughter in England. Rev. Williams' old home. Rev. Williams and family will sail for home some time the last of this month or the first of next. John E. Silver, a farmer living about four and a half miles east of Cantril, Iowa, hung himself in his buggy shed Friday morning. His hired hand discovered him and cut him down. Two physicians were called and succeeded in saving his life. Mr. Silver had recently sold his farm, and it is thought that brooding over the sale caused his mind to become unbalanced. A deplorable state and one very dangerous to the health of the people in the vicinity is the condition in which the sewerage at the end of the main sewer under the Seventh street bridge is in at present. The sewer empties into the creek known as Bloody Run and in a wet season the refuse is carried down to the river, but with a dry spell like the one just past the matter forms foul smelling cesspools along the bottom of the creek. Enough typhoid germs breed under these conditions to cause an epidemic that would fill the hospitals to overflowing. Lime was placed in the pools and the rain last evening helped the conditions a little. Fire started early Saturday morning at a quarter past three o'clock in the double two story frame residence occupied by the Pullis and Hough families at Second and Fulton streets. The blaze which was a bad one but which was kept from spreading to adjoining property, was supposed to have originated from a cigarette thrown carelessly in one of the apartments of the house. Mrs. Ann Pullis and son David who reside in one side of the house, awoke and discovered their home in flames. They quickly made exit, scantily attired, as did Grace and Hiram Hough, who live in the other half of the house. The alarm of fire was turned in by Mrs. James Simon who lives next door to the burning building, at 209 Fulton. Mrs. Simon had been wakened on account of illness and discovered her neighbor's property blazing during her insomnia. Mrs. Pullis had to be restrained from entering her home several times by her son, as she tried to get articles of furniture. Being in very moderate circumstances, the loss of furniture and other things destroyed by the blaze will come heavily on the good woman and her neighbor tenant, who lost by the early morning conflagration. Chief Anderson and his braves kept the fire centered in the one building and rendered excellent service, the walls of the house being left upright after the fire was extinguished and the place not beyond repair. Attorney John E. Craig is owner of the property.


