BURLINGTON, Iowa, Aug. 22.—Burlington and Keokuk cut the honors fairly in two yesterday afternoon in the twin events. The first game was an easy conquest for Pa Belt's team, owing to the fact that the locals became infected with a touch of demoralization and in spite of securing 14 blows, could not land the game. It was really the first loose exhibition put up by the home team for some time and the unkind remarks by some of the fans were entirely uncalled for. There is not a ball club in existence that does not have its off days and Burlington experienced this disability. In the first place Second Baseman Matt, who has worked harder than any other player in the league to give satisfaction and delivered the goods, was indisposed. McManus is suffering from a sore finger and was not feeling well and in this way the slump resulted. Danny Mannix who went in to relieve Wood, worked well and with the usual good support, might have given a better account of himself. Pop Eyer was a joke for the local batsmen and had he not been withdrawn, there is no telling what might have happened. Prough was effective when it was necessary. Umpire Nugent came in for a large share of condemnation, which was not deserved, as he umpired a good game, having an unusually large number of close decisions and he called nine-tenths of them right, the opinion of the folks who called him "bum," "whiskey soak," "robber," et cetera, notwithstanding.

The feature of the first game was a triple play, the first of the season in these parts, contributed to largely by the dismayed efforts of the local players. Willie Wood started the first game bravely enough, but proved too great a benefactor to the batting averages of the visitors. Hunter, first up, fanned. Herbert singled and Bresnahan ditto. Hughie Miller cracked the ball to far into center field. He scored the other two, but was caught at third base trying to stretch his hit into a three bagger. Belt then cracked the sphere over the fence, making three runs. It looked fair to tie the score in the local half, when Miller got to first base on a third strike wild pitch. He advanced to third on Matt's single and scored on Geler's infield out. Clark was hit and Dowling's single scored Matt. The celebrated triple play came in the second inning. It will never happen just like this again, unless in a game between the inmates of a bug-house. The bases were full on successive singles by McManus, Mannix and Hildebrand. Miller hit to Collins who threw McManus out at the plate. Cavanaugh tried to get Miller at first but failed, but for some reason or other Hildebrand failed to go to second and the ball was shot down there by Miller and another out recorded. Mannix who had been wandering aimlessly up and down between second and third base then woke up and tried to reach third, but was caught while sliding into the bag. In the third Hunter started with a two base hit. Herbert sacrificed him to third, lived on an error and stole second base. Bresnahan scored both of them with a single.
