SHOOTING FOWLS IS BAD BUSINESS

Farmers in Des Moines Bottoms Much Annoyed by Persons With Guns Who Pop Their Chickens.

LEAVE THEM LAY

Hunters and Others With Firearms Try to See How Many They Can Kill at One Shot.

Farmers and non-agriculturists of the Des Moines Valley, of what is known as the "bottoms" near Keokuk, have been worried into paroxysms lately by parties of hunters and other malicious persons who willfully shoot the young chickens of those living in the valley, then either carry them off or let them lay where they have fallen after being struck with the lead from a shot gun or a rifle.

Several families in the bottoms have notified the officers of the shooting of their chickens by persons with guns from Keokuk and some of those who have been so hasty as to make way with the fowls in this manner are known and it is surprising that they have not better sense than to kill young chickens, some of them not more than six and seven weeks old.

One party reports that four choice hens were killed last Sunday, the man behind the gun then walking up and carrying them away. One day last week, a half dozen "springers" were laid low with a shot gun and left where they fell.

The practice is one that should be condemned and those who have been doing this malicious work of shooting chickens, take warning and, as the slang phrase says, "cut it out."
