HONOR KEOKUK HIBERNIANS

Mrs. Anna McBride Was Elected Vice President of Ladies Auxiliary and Jas. Welsh to State Board.

LARGE DELEGATION

Ladies Auxiliary of This City has Second Largest Number in Attendance at Iowa City Meet.

Mrs. Anna McBride of this city, was elected vice president of the ladies auxiliary, Ancient Order of Hibernians, at the state convention which closed in Iowa City yesterday. The delegation from the local auxiliary to the state meeting was exceeded in numbers only by the Davenport delegation. Those from Keokuk present were the following: Mrs. Anns McBride, Mrs. Harry B. Watson, Mrs. John Brassil, Sr. and daughters, Miss Alice and Miss Mary, Miss Nellie Roan, Miss Nellie Hanson, Miss Alice Welsh, Miss Winnifred Conroy, Miss Susie Cowley, Mrs. Henry Flood and daughter, Mrs. Mary McGettigan, Mrs. Kate Niland and Mrs. B. L. Welsh.

The ladies' auxiliary of the state are to have a scholarship in conjunction with the Ancient Order of Hibernians. The scholarship will be in one of the Catholic schools of the state and will be paid for by the two organizations. One year it will be given to a boy student in Irish history and the next year to a girl student, alternating in this manner. Only recently Irish history was introduced into the Catholic schools of Keokuk and other cities of the state.

At the joint convention at Iowa City the Hibernians of Keokuk were also honored by the election as a member of the state board, of Joseph Welsh, who is the Lee county president.

In his address before the Hibernians President Thomas Maloney mentioned a former Keokuk priest who has done much for Irish history, as follows:

The propaganda for disseminating Irish history must be continued and fostered in every possible way. The national committee on Irish history wisely recommends that—where efforts to introduce it into the public or parochial schools fail, local Hibernians should strenuously labor to

establish Irish history classes, at least once a week. The national organization, aided by Prof. Rohan, national chairman, has done a great work along this line, during the past two years. In this field of endeavor Iowa (Rohan says) has made the most creditable showing of any state in the union, membership considered. Special thanks are due Rev. Father Patrick McDermott, of Masena, Iowa, chairman, and F. B. Sharon, of the Catholic Messenger, in this field for splendid work. Let the good work go on. It is right that we should inculcate in the minds of our young people, as well as the older ones, a love for the history of the land of our forefathers.

—The Sunday morning issue of The Gate City will furnish Keokuk merchants the largest advertising value ever offered by a Keokuk newspaper.






