



Mrs. E. D. E. N. Southworth, whose novel "Ishmael" has been dramatized by Grace Hayward, dramatist of "Graustark" and "St. Elmo" and which will be presented for the first time here Tuesday evening, Sept. 6, at the Keokuk opera house, is better known to a past generation, but retains much popularity with present day fiction readers. She has written 68 novels and one of her stories, "The Hidden Hand," achieved much success on the American and English stage.

Mrs. Southworth was Emma Dorothy Eliza Navitte when she was married to Frederick Southworth. The marriage proved unhappy and she went to teaching in the Washington public schools to support herself. Her first serial story, "Retribution," was printed in 1847.

For thirty years thereafter she wrote exclusively for the New York Ledger. She was an ardent abolitionist and her writings are said to have been a great help to the northern cause. She has produced as several as three books a year and many of them have been translated in Spain, Germany and France. They have been distinguished chiefly for a distinct moral purpose which is always in evidence in "Ishmael" and which spirit Miss Hayward as the dramatist was not slow to detect and impress in the stage story.

Mrs. Southworth is said to have been the inventor of the manila box

envelope which was patented by others. She was born December 26, 1819, in Washington, D. C.
