—Capt. F. L. Howe, formerly of the steamer Black Hawk, left for Davenport at 1:55 yesterday to go on the steamer Ben Hur, which is being taken to Mound City where she will enter the ways and undergo general repairs.

—Andrew Lofquist has brought suit in the district court against B. F. Larson for \$46. It is alleged that on April 12 the plaintiff sold to the defendant lot 2 and the easterly half of lot 3, block 174, and the defendant was to liquidate a bill of \$46 which the plaintiff was owing to a local firm.

—A Gate City representative caught a black hand writer in the act last night between the hours of 9 and 10 o'clock in the postoffice. It was a colored man addressing a postal card.

—Lee O'Neil Browne was declared not guilty of bribery by the Chicago jury and that ends his case. There are many people who believe that the jury made a mistake and that Chicago justice is blind.

—Keokuk merchants have made ample preparation to care for the fall and winter trade. The latest and best merchandise will be offered at the right price. When you want reliable goods late yesterday afternoon at St. Louis in his aeroplane the Red Devil, which were considered by aeronauts to be the best flights ever witnessed in this section.

—De La Salle council, Knights of Columbus, will observe "Landing Day" on October 12, which is the anniversary of the discovery of America by Christopher Columbus. In some states "Landing Day" is a legal holiday, but Iowa has not as yet dropped into line. The occasion will be largely observed by the order of the Knights of Columbus all over the country. The local council has decided to hold a banquet in its hall at which the members and ladies will attend. The principal orator of the occasion will be the Hon. E. G. Dunn of Mason City, one of the most eloquent speakers in the state of Iowa. In addition to the address of Mr. Dunn, there will be a musical program and short talks by local members. No effort will be spared to make the occasion one of moment and fitting celebration of the memorable date. Theodore Roosevelt and Burke Cochran will be the principal speakers at the "Landing Day" banquet at Peoria.

—The steamer Grace will move from her port in the locks Tuesday and move the dredge Hecla from the dry docks to the guard lock and then to the canal where it will be engaged for several weeks. Capt. Adams of the steamer Grace, stated that the supply of coal was becoming scarce but that it would not interfere with the dredge work which must be completed this season.

—The passenger trade to and from this city is beginning to slacken up for the last few days but previous to this time the passenger business has been exceptionally large, in fact, it has surpassed that of many years.

—Last night it was stated that Jerome Keouch took the pool championship from Hueston last evening in a tedious match which was held at St. Louis. The score of the match was not given.

—The through boats of the Diamond Jo line running between St. Louis and St. Paul have been laid up all this season except one—the Sidney, which has only been able to make three trips, owing to the low water.

—A new set of pictures have been taken by a local photographer of work across the river on the water power dam. They show several excellent views of the quarry and changes that have taken place during the past month.

—Yesterday work was commenced by the city of the cutting of an alley between blocks Fifth and Sixth and Palean and Carroll. This new entrance has long been wished for by the people of that vicinity.

—C. L. Pickett, M. D., who has been in missionary work in the Philippine Islands, will speak at the First Christian church this morning. He is the accredited missionary for the Christian church located at Laoag, Ilocos Norte, Philippine Islands. The public is invited.
