

TO RESTRAIN SALOON MEN

Notices of Injunction Proceedings Against Burlington Saloonkeepers Placed in Hands of Sheriff There.

FORTY-TWO IN THE LIST

Names Not Yet Made Public but It Is Believed That Action Is Instituted by Anti-Saloon League.

Injunctions against forty-two Burlington saloonkeepers and the owners of the buildings in which the saloons are located will be asked by M. S. Reusch, a minister of Mediapolis, who, it is reported, is acting in behalf of the Anti-Saloon League of Iowa. Saturday Sheriff Williams received the original notices to be served on the proprietors of the saloons and the property owners. Until service is secured, the sheriff will not divulge the names of the defendants but it is reported that many of the down town saloonkeepers are cited, and several on the hills.

Next Thursday is the last day for filing suits in the district court for the November term and the injunction petitions must be filed with the clerk of the court November 3 at the latest. Temporary and perpetual restraining orders will be asked of the court against the saloon owners.

The specific charges cannot be discovered until the petitions are filed, and the full extent of the alleged violations of the mulct law will only become known when these petitions are in the hands of the clerk.

Attorney M. S. Odell of Des Moines, said to be acting for the Anti-Saloon league is the man who attended to the preliminary work of starting the injunction proceedings.

There are sixty-eight saloons operating in Burlington, and thus only twenty-six of the number have not come under the action of the plaintiff in the injunction proceedings.

Several days ago a stranger appeared at the Burlington court house, and looked over the records of saloon licenses in the treasurer's office. The bonds of the saloon men filed with the auditor, were also examined. This man is supposed to be the Des Moines attorney, who gave the notices to the sheriff to serve.

It is impossible to forecast the charges that will be brought against the saloon men in seeking the injunctions. The proprietors as a whole state they have been exceedingly careful to obey the terms of the mulct law, with respect to the opening and closing hours, Sunday observance and the various other provisions of the statute. Many of the owners have had signs placed in their doorways forbidding entrance to minors and it is said this provision has been carefully observed.

ber of them will be retained by the saloon men and owners of the buildings when the injunction cases are presented in court.

One attorney stated that he understood Attorney Odell represented the Anti-Saloon league, which has inaugurated an active campaign in Iowa. There is an attorney's fee connected with these cases which may result in considerable profit to the Des Moines lawyer.

In summing up in a conclusion the Burlington Hawk-Eye says:

This sudden movement against the saloons of Burlington is not only a great surprise to our citizens, but it is difficult to fathom the motive. Coming, as it does, upon the eve of the biennial election, it has the appearance of a move by, and in the interest of the Third Party Prohibitionists, who are working for a constitutional amendment prohibiting the manufacture and sale of intoxicants in Iowa.

By entering these suits on the eve of the election, it may be thought by the Third Party workers that the friends of that party will be aroused to increased activity in the campaign and work at the polls for their ticket. Or it may be in their thought that by bringing numerous actions at Cedar Rapids, Burlington and other cities, public opinion will be led to the conclusion that the mulct law is a failure, that its regulations and restrictions are ignored by the dealers, and the only alternative is constitutional prohibition.

This would have in view especially the election of members of the general assembly who would vote to submit a constitutional amendment to the voters, or else the calling of a constitutional convention.

The foregoing reasons are only conjectural. The Hawk-Eye being unable to find anyone who knows anything about the origin and purpose of the movement. The belief has prevailed that the saloons of Burlington have been and are being conducted in compliance with the terms of the mulct law, it is not improbable, of course, that out of a total of sixty-eight saloons a few may have transgressed some provision of the law, but it hardly seems probable that so large a number have violated the law in any essential particular. That also, is conjectural, and it remains to be ascertained when these cases come up for trial in the district court whether there have been infractions sufficient serious to warrant permanent injunctions.

Suits of this character ought not to be brought upon mere technical or trivial charges. There is scarcely any citizen who does not transgress in some form, some statute or city ordinance, usually without knowledge or wrong intention, and when notified, promptly corrects the mistake. The saloon men are entitled to the same policy of reasonable consideration where there is no wrong intent. All are equal before the law. But where there is flagrant and repeated violation with manifest disregard of the liquor law, or any other laws of the state, or the city ordinances of Burlington, then the duty of the law officers is manifest and should be courageously and impartially exercised.

LONE CHIMNEY IN MONUMENT

Friday Memorial Shaft at Ft. Madison Was Unveiled by Jean Epsy Chapter, D. A. R.


The Lone Chimney monument, erected by Jean Epsy chapter of the D. A. R. on the site of old Fort Madison, was officially unveiled at 3 o'clock Friday afternoon. Deputy District Attorney George B. Stewart delivered the unveiling address. Robert S. Coasey and Albert Phillips, sons of officers of the chapter managed the uncovering. The local post of the G. A. R. attended in a body, the public and parochial schools closed for the afternoon and a chorus of scholars sang patriotic hymns at the monument. Governor Carroll had been invited to attend and his absence was deeply regretted.

Old Fort Madison was established in 1805 by Zebulon M. Pike, then on an exploring expedition north from St. Louis. A lieutenant and platoon of soldiers were stationed here, quartered in block houses and surrounded by a stockade. Many stories of hazardous adventures with the Indians, romances and love stories of the Indian maidens and the soldiers are handed down by the settlers. One of them which has become history is of the devotion of a pretty Indian maid to one of the officers of the fort, how she once saved the garrison from a terrible fate by revealing an Indian plot to massacre them. The Indians crept to the very gates of the stockade when a masked cannon was suddenly brought into view and the attack was stopped. Then the Indians began a siege which ended with the garrison tunneling to the river, a scarce ten rods away, and in the darkness of a night in 1812, slipped quietly out on the bosom of the Father of Waters, the last man applying a torch to the dry logs of the block house.

The party went on their way to headquarters at St. Louis. All that remained of the structures was a large, bare stone chimney, which stood like a sentinel over the ashes of the fort. To the surrounding tribes of Indians, the explorers and the first settlers the place was nicknamed from that time on as Poto-wonok, or the Lone Chimney. So Friday, as nearly as possible on the same spot, in the eastern part of the city, a few feet from the same well which was used by the garrison and the Indians, and is still in use, "the Lone Chimney" was appropriately unveiled.


