At the Break of Day the Veteran Wagon Maker Answered the Toll of Death's Bell Peacefully.

AN OLD FIREMAN

Many Relatives Survive Him—War Man of Few Words They Being Only to the Good of His Fellowmen.

At 5 o'clock this morning occurred the death of William John Loewenstein at his home, No. 1326 Johnson street.

He was born in Hessen, Darmstadt, Germany, January 1, 1830, and in 1844 migrated to this country, landing in New Orleans from where he moved to St. Louis.

When health permitted him to follow his trade as wagon maker he was always attentive to his work and in his time was considered a master of the art.

As a man he was of a noble character, always willing to help those who were in need and possessed a wide acquaintance of friends.

He is survived by the following: Five sons, J. W. Loewenstein, Jr., George Loewenstein, Chris Loewenstein, E. H. Loewenstein and Henry D. Loewenstein, of West Burlington.
