### THE LAST CHANCE TO REGISTER

Boards Will Be in Session All Day For the Last Time.  
Have you registered? Well, tomorrow is your last chance. If you are going to be sure that you can exercise your right as an American citizen next Tuesday you must go before the board of registration, and see that your name is on the poll books.  
The registration boards will be in session from 9 o'clock tomorrow morning until 9 o'clock at night, so you still have time. The same hours and regulations apply to every city in the state, having a population of 2,500 or more.  
While it is true that those who registered at the last general election two years ago or any other election since then, excepting the June primary, are not required by law to register again, so many mistakes are made in copying and making out new poll books that to go before his registration board and see that his name is correctly recorded.  
There has been considerable misunderstanding over the possibility of registering on election day. It is only in the county precincts and in towns of less than 2,500 inhabitants, where there are no other registration days provided, that this is possible. In the

She rushed into the bedroom where her husband and children were asleep and screamed for help. Grabbing a comforter from the bed, her husband made a frantic effort to smother the flames, which enveloped the woman. The flames spread to the clothing on the bed in which lay the children.

### WHO IS HE? WHAT IS HE?

Well Dressed Stranger, Giving the Name of Lewis, Given Thirty Day's Sentence for "Vagging."

### HAS A GAME ARM

Refuses to Leave City Though He is Offered Railroad Transportation—Was "Pegging a Week Ago."

Frank Lewis, a well dressed fellow, about thirty-five years old is a puzzle to the police. Yesterday afternoon Lewis was confronted by the police magistrate, Judge McNamara, and pleaded guilty to the charge of vagrancy. The sentence doled out to him was thirty days in jail.

Against this sentence, Lewis protests vigorously and says that he is being wrongfully detained by the police. He also says that when he is released he will commence suit against the city for being falsely held. Where he is from and what his history is, the man locked up declines to say. He has told the officers that he came here from Duvenport, and from his appearance one would little suspect him of being a "vag." About ten days ago Lewis was picked up by an officer for going about the city with a list, asking alms of people. Some one put the police wise to the game thinking that he was a bit crooked, and Lewis was lodged in jail.

Night before last the man was offered a ticket to Ft. Madison by the city attorney if he would leave, but Lewis declined the railroad coupon, saying that he was not through here yet, and had business matters to look after. During several talks with the chief of police, the fellow in jail has maintained a bold and obstinate front and has asked that the charge against him be changed to something else besides vagrancy, saying that the police were making a mistake by holding him on that ground. At different times Lewis told the police he wanted to go to Quincy, Ft. Madison, St. Louis and Burlington.

**Life Resident of Alexandria.**  
James Linden Hogan was born on a farm ten miles west of Alexandria, December 15th 1856. When a lad his parents died and he removed to Alexandria with his sister. There for a number of years he was engaged in the grain business, buying and selling. For the past ten years, however, he had been in the employ of the Bott Cooperage establishment in Alexandria, as night watchman and engineer.

It was while attending to his duties in the barrel plant yesterday morning that the awful fatality befell Mr. Hogan causing him to dash, maddened with the excruciating pain caused by the drenching of steam and boiling water, to his home a quarter of a mile away.

**One of Oldest Odd Fellows.**  
Mr. Hogan was one of the oldest Odd Fellows in the state of Missouri, having been affiliated with the social life of that secret order for the past thirty-five years. He had attained the highest office in the lodge in Missouri in which he was a member. He belonged to no church.

The deceased was one of the most prominent residents of Alexandria, a man of high moral standing and a steady craftsman. In the large Bott plant he was one of the most valued employes and was looked up to by the leading assets in that business.

Mr. Hogan had one sister, unmarried, Miss Sarah Hogan, who resides in Alexandria. The wife of the deceased passed away some time ago. There are living, five children, three daughters and two sons. One son, Harry Hogan resides at 1423 Carroll street. The other children who survive are: Beatrice, of Hannibal, and Ruth, Emmet and Carmie of Alexandria.

### DEATH RELIEVES ALEXANDRIA MAN

James Hogan Succumbs to Awful Scalding He Received, Passing Away at 9:30 Last Night.

### BURIAL TO BE SUNDAY

Deceased One of the Oldest Odd Fellows in State Where he Had Lived All His Life.

Suffering intensely from the terrible scalding which he received over almost every portion of his body yesterday morning, James L. Hogan expired at Graham hospital last night at half past nine. Death came as a relief to the intense pain which attending physicians tried to alleviate, but it was known an hour after his serious mishap yesterday morning at six o'clock that the victim of the unusual and horrible accident could not survive.

Relatives of the deceased Alexandria citizen and engineer, arrived in the city today and were busied making preparations for burial. The body was taken last night to the undertaking parlors of Crimmins and Chase where it was prepared for services and removed this afternoon at 1:15 to the late family home of the deceased at Alexandria.
