MIDNIGHT STIR ON MAIN STREET

Some Excitement Occasioned Saturday Night When Daisy Ball Grew Troublesome and Citizens Interfered.

BALL'S ARREST FOLLOWS

Was Taken to the Station After the Front Door at 817 Main Street Had Been Kicked In—Two Cuts on Forehead.

Some excitement for a half hundred wild-eyed but timid citizens was occasioned near the midnight hour Saturday night at 817 Main street, where Daisy Ball, an employe of Huiskamp Bros., was staging the climax of his night of carousing. A few moments later, after the main street door had been kicked in and Ball's mother and sister rescued from the abuse that the drunken man had been heaping upon their heads, the patrol drove up and Ball was hurried to the police station with two deep cuts over his right eye that necessitated prompt medical attention. On the police tab the arrested man was charged with being drunk and disturbing the peace.

The story that reached the police was somewhat distorted and some of the facts were hard to substantiate. It seems as though Ball had been out since the early evening visiting the rum shops, until he was pretty well under the influence of the demon fire water. In this condition it is said that his wife, formerly a Hamilton girl, and his sister discovered him and sought to bring him to the Hough residence, 817 Main street. The report reached the police that he was brought home in a carriage and that the cuts on his forehead, just above the left eye was caused by a horse's hoof, following a fall. He was brought into the place of business of Mr. Hough and it was there that citizens declare he became very abusive to other members of the family. The noise attracted many passersby who stood abashed, until two of the venturesome ones crashed in the door with their feet and hurried to the rescue. Ball was humble enough when confronted by this interference from without and the excitement subsided immediately. Ball was taken to the station where Dr. Dimond, city physician, dressed his wounds. One was quite a deep one, which crossed the left eyebrow.
