

TEACHERS CLOSE BIG CONVENTION

Bitterly Oppose Appropriation by Congress for Private Institutions and Want More Normals.

KEOKUK TEACHERS HOME

Large Number From This City Who Were in Attendance Arrived in Keokuk Either Saturday or Sunday.

The teachers of Iowa are bitterly opposed to the national school funds being turned over to private educational institutions in the District of Columbia for the promotion of education in agriculture and mechanical arts.

The teachers of the state in their closing session in Des Moines placed themselves on record against the bills of legislation now before congress which assigns to private institutions funds from the federal treasury.

The educators approved of the request of E. E. Brown, commissioner of the national department of education for an additional appropriation of \$75,000 for the purpose of employing competent specialists to investigate the subject of the construction of school buildings, school administration, accounting and statistics, industrial education, education for house-keeping, school hygiene, agriculture and mechanical colleges and the wider uses of the school plant.

The state association will do all in its power to defeat the congressional enactments calling for federal aid for private institutions and to assist Commissioner Brown in his request for a larger appropriation to extend the activities of his department.

The recommendation of the educational council for a legislative enactment for compulsory medical inspection in the public schools met the hearty endorsement of the general association. It also urged the extension of high school training in the rural districts.

A surprise in the resolution recommendations and which met no opposition was that of the recommendation of not only more normal schools in Iowa, but the extension of the high school curriculum to include a normal course.

In his annual message to the association, President Hill M. Bell of Drake university, president of the association, recommended the extension of the high school course of study and discouraged the establishment of more normal schools. The county superintendents recommend the normal course in high schools as did the rural teachers. While these educational departments were urging the high school plan, which would include state aid to those high schools giving normal courses, an independent body of teachers were in conference devising ways and means of making a state-wide campaign in the interest of the establishment of more normal schools to meet the needs of the rural teachers. When both recommendations were included in the report of the resolution committee neither faction made objection and the association goes on record as in favor of both plans.
