**Returns Are Slow.** SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 9.—Returns are coming in very slow and it will be late today before the complete vote is known. Returns now indicate the socialist vote as a big factor in the state. J. S. Wilson, polled an unusually heavy vote in the cities that resulted in upsetting calculations of the politicians. Theo. A. Bell, democrat candidate, polled a much smaller vote than expected. The socialist vote is responsible for Bell's small vote. Both sides are claiming victories and the indications are the result will not be known until the full count is completed. In Sacramento, Bell's plurality was reduced to 300.

**From California.** SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 9.—The congressional returns today are unreliable. Kent, insurgent republican, Knowland, standpat republican, McArthur, democrat; Hayes, insurgent republican; Leedham, standpat republican; Stevens, insurgent republican and Smith standpat, will likely be elected.

**Dahlman Defeats.** OMAHA, Nov. 9.—The returns from forty precincts of Nebraska give Aldrich, republican a majority of 9,000. This wipes out Dahlman's majority in Douglas county and insures Aldrich's election by 20,000.

**INDIA, APOLIS, Nov. 9.**—The latest returns indicate that the legislature is democratic by fifteen and this means defeat for Beveridge.

**MILWAUKEE, Nov. 9.**—The republican state ticket has been elected by from 35,000 to 40,000. The candidate

### New York Clean Sweep.

NEW YORK, Nov. 9.—Additional returns today only emphasize the completeness of the democratic victory in New York. They have reversed a republican majority of 60 in the legislature to a democratic majority of 25, and have made a clean gain of ten congressmen. Aside from Dix, the entire democratic ticket was elected. Wm. W. Cocks, Roosevelt's home congressman, was defeated.

### Stocks Take Tumble.

NEW YORK, Nov. 9.—The satisfaction of Wall street over the election result was reflected by higher prices this morning for stocks and bonds, but later they took a tumble.

LONDON, Nov. 9.—American stocks on the London exchange showed unusual strength today over the defeat of Roosevelt, as it is referred to here. The Londoners think an era of stability in American stocks is coming.

ST. LOUIS, Nov. 9.—Prohibition was defeated in Missouri by at least 100,000. St. Louis has been swept by the republicans. Both sides have made inroads on each other so that the incomplete returns make it impossible to tell the full result. Though the state ticket is in doubt, it is conceded the democrats have the legislature which means that Reed will be the next senator.

### Colorado is Close.

DENVER, Nov. 9.—After 14 hours of ballot counting the definite result is far from determined. Both republicans and democrats are claiming the state by upwards of 2000. The Rocky Mountain News asserts that the democrats have won. The News also claims that the initiative and referendum amendment has carried overwhelmingly.

**Champ Clark Happy.** BOWLING GREEN, Mo. Nov. 9.—Champ Clark made his first statement today regarding his intention. He declared the democrats would make good in their control of the lower house and that he expects to be elected speaker.

### Cannon Elected.

Danville, Ill., Nov. 9.—Joseph G. Cannon, speaker of the house, is re-elected to congress from the 18th district by a slightly reduced plurality.

Mr. Cannon said: "I am elected by 6,000. I am a republican. I have kept the faith. I have endorsed and have not apologized for the legislation of this congress."

### Hints on Cleaning the Sink

Every sink should be provided with a three-cornered sieve made by covering a metal frame with very fine netting. When water is thrown into the sink it should be turned into this sieve, preventing the solid matter from getting into the pipes and causing trouble. Each time the dishes are washed the sink should be carefully cleaned. ### BIG WORK ON THE WATER POWER

Work of Surveying Land Above Fort Madison to be Overlooked by Water Power to Start This Week.

FOR 2ND INSTALLATION

Want the information so as to Know Exactly What Property Will be Affected in the Future.

The following statement concerning work on the Keokuk and Hamilton Water Power Company dam was issued this afternoon from the offices of the company, and is a piece of news that should add to the general faith already placed in the enterprise. Work in a big way will be in progress on this immense proposition within a short time.

Work will be started this week on the surveys of the land to be overflowed by the second installation above Ft. Madison. This land will probably not be required by the Power Company for several years, because of the fact that until the machinery for the second installation is installed, the water will not be held at a stage which will affect it.

The Power Company wishes these surveys completed however, in order that it may know exactly what property will be affected in the future.

This work was partially done in 1906, but since that time the upriver flowage conditions as affected by the dam have been materially altered by the change in the design of the dam.

As is well known the crest of the dam has been lowered eleven feet and 116 steel gates are to be installed above this crest. These gates can be opened when the river is high, thus greatly lessening the effect of the dam on the river shores. As a matter of fact, practically no land will be flooded above Ft. Madison which is not already subject to overflow under present conditions.

The surveying will be confined to the Illinois shore for the present, the first party starting near East Ft. Madison.

—Waterloo Reporter: A lot is constantly being said about the ethical relations of the newspaper with its reading public. An equal amount of comment might be suggested the "other way about." It is almost safe to say that without a single exception, if a man or woman courteously approached a reporter and confided in him and asked him to respect and withhold his information from the public, it would meet with absolute sincerity. Too often the reporter is treated as an enemy to shun—and, just as often, it makes him so. Still another point is pertinent. If there is a cause to be served and exploited the reporter is early sought and space asked for its liberal promotion. That is, of course, legitimate and all right. On the other hand, when he, or she, has a really good news item that would add much to the reporter's poverty stricken store, he or she, often considers it an intrusion of his privacy and a personal affront if asked for its use in the news columns. Give and take, make an excellent ethical basis upon which the people and their paper might meet. Many have adopted its principles, but there are still a few who might improve through the practice of its precepts.

### REPUBLICANS WIN IN HANCOCK COUNTY

Pick Cream of Offices in Yesterday's Election—Two of the Representatives Are Republicans.

CARTHAGE, Ill., Nov. 9.—A republican victory is conceded in Hancock county, Ill. Frank Thornberry, candidate for county clerk, is the third republican to be elected to this office in the county. His majority over Ray Barber was 226.

Alfred Baird (rep.) was given a 600 majority over Charles James for county judge.

Charles Tyler (dem.) won over William Boswell by 82 majority for county treasurer.

S. D. Faris (dem.) was returned victorious with a 720 majority over James Spence for county superintendent of schools.

For congress, McKinney, Republican, was elected.

For representative the following were elected: Dr. Martin (rep.) of LaHarpe; Henry Terrell (rep.) of Colchester; John Huston (democrat) of Blindsville.

Elmer McAdams, candidate for sheriff (rep.) was given a majority of 600 over James Morris.

### LAKE BOTTOM IS VERY DEEP

Nearly Five Hundred Feet Below the Level of the Ocean

SPOKANE, Wash., Nov. 9.—Four hundred and ninety-seven feet below the level of the sea is the bottom of Lake Chelan, in Chelan county, north central Washington, according to a report by the United States geological survey, which shows the lake to be 1,597 feet deep. The altitude is about 1,100 feet. For years it was believed by residents in the district and sportsmen from various parts of the country who flock there every season for fish and game, that the lake is so deep it could not be sounded. This was given out following numerous unsuccessful attempts by farmers and others to find bottom. The facts were reported to the geological survey and experts were sent to the lake some time ago. They took soundings in various parts of the lake, which is more than 40 miles in length. The results of their work is published in a report issued recently by the department. In addition to the foregoing statistics there is a mass of technical information.
