CITY NEWS.

—Use a Gate City want ad. —Smoke Moelle's Silver Ash cigar. —But a few weeks until Christmas. —Mrs. Cortes Maxwell, 713 High street, began her primary music class for piano, on November 1. Graded pupils two weeks later. —Keep your eye on Keokuk. This city has the best future of any city in the state. —Not too early to do your Christmas shopping. The Keokuk merchants will supply you with the right kind of merchandise. —Rev. J. W. Potter's bible class will meet this evening at the Young Womens' Christian association, in regular weekly session. —The activity on the water power dam is creating an additional interest in Keokuk real estate. A large number of deals are in process. —The fire department was called to Ridge street, between Twelfth and Thirteenth street Sunday afternoon, where weeds were burning. No property loss resulted. —The presence of Engineer Hugh L. Cooper in the city today gave additional reason for increased faith in the big dam. His statements regarding the water power are very reassuring. —Elders Charles Fry of Burlington and M. H. Siegfried of Nauvoo will conduct a series of meetings at the Latter Day Saints church, Thirteenth and Bank streets, during this week and over next Sunday, each evening at 7:30. A welcome is extended to all. —The directors of the Keokuk Hotel should get together soon and decide on an addition to the hotel. The popular Keokuk Hotel is filled to overflowing almost every night and the proposed addition should become a fact as quickly as possible. This city will need it. —Evangelist L. Milton Williams, the evangelist who commenced a series of meetings at the Pentecostal church, 324 Main street, yesterday, is one of those forceful speakers whose great work is confined to speaking to the masses and all classes. The evangelist spoke to a good sized audience last night and will be at the church every evening this week. The public is cordially invited to hear him and it will be a rare treat to receive the words of a man who is used to addressing an audience of from 500 to 2,000. —By Tuesday of this week the officers of the Keokuk police force will have as complete an outfit of clothing as any of the more metropolitan city policemen of the country. On the fifteenth the new overcoats to be worn by the local police will have arrived. The big over-garments will be full length with brass buttons that set off a uniform and give taste and appearance to the rest of the uniform. The overcoats will be heavy and comfortable. —Burlington Gazette: The November term of the district court convenes next Monday afternoon at 2:00 o'clock. The grand jury will be selected and the forty-eight saloon injunction cases brought by Attorney Odle of Des Moines are set down for hearing. What the procedure will be, remains to be seen. Whether the Anti-Saloon league attorney can convince the court that the local liquor dealers have been violating the liquor laws of the state or not is problematical. The defendants in all the cases have secured counsel and will fight the cases to the bitter end. Judge W. S. Withrow will preside at the November term. —Ottumwa Courier: Francis M. Hunter, one of the four judges-elect of the second judicial district, this morning sent his letter of resignation from the post of referee in bankruptcy to Judge Smith McPherson, the same to take effect as soon as his successor is qualified or by December 31, 1910. The severing of ties between Mr. Hunter and the federal court brings to a close a most pleasant service continuing since September 26, 1884, on which date the Ottumwa attorney was appointed clerk of the United States court at Council Bluffs. Mr. Hunter has been associated with the court in various capacities since that time. On September 26, 1884 Mr. Hunter was named as clerk of the United States court in Council Bluffs by Judge J. M. Love a democrat. On October 19, 1899, he resigned the clerkship to become United States commissioner. This post he held until September 1, 1908, when he resigned and was appointed referee in bankruptcy. He has served under three judges, J. M. Love of Council Bluffs, John S. Woolson of Mt. Pleasant, and Smith McPherson of Red Oak.
