Yesterday the Company Took a Two Year Lease on the Rand Building With Option to Purchase it at End of Time.

Yesterday the Keokuk and Hamilton Water Power Co. took a two year lease on the Rand building, the quarters at present occupied, corner of Third and Johnson streets, and will immediately begin the reconstruction of the interior and make improvements that will call for an expenditure of approximately \$1500 and give to the water power people a modern office building.

CHAMBERS WINS BY ONE VOTE

A Mistake Was Found by Supervisors In Carrying Out Tally in Second Ward at Fort Madison.

JUDGES CONFIRM IT

Were Called to Rectify Mistake and Did so at Once—Legal Fight Is Expected to Result From It.

By just one vote Fred C. Chambers republican candidate to succeed himself as recorder of deeds for Lee county, with Ed. G. Vaughan as his deputy in Keokuk, has been declared elected over Joseph N. Hays, the democratic candidate, following the deadlock which has existed since the election, Tuesday.

That one vote which swings the election result in favor of the present incumbent was found in the Second ward of Fort Madison. In going over the poll book yesterday afternoon the supervisors found that a mistake had been made in that ward in carrying out the tallies. The vote for Chambers should have totaled 134, when, by mistake, it was made to read 132. The mistake was obvious when the poll book was opened. It was seen in the last tally at the end of the column, where there were four marks, thus making it impossible for a total of 133 to result.

When this was found word was sent by the supervisors to the judges of election and they were called to rectify their error. After some delay the judges reported, and made the proper correction, after the vote had been examined.

Both Fred C. Chambers and his deputy have been receiving congratulations today.

It is expected that a legal contest will result. However, Chambers will be the recorder during the litigation, if such results.


