Police Are Amused by Story Yet Feel Sorry for Woman Who Says She is Pursued by Enemies.

CHASED FOR TEN YEARS

Everywhere She Goes Some One Throws White Vitrol on Her and She Immediately Gets "Canned."

Acting strangely, a woman by the name of Mrs. Mary M. Brown, appeared at the police station this afternoon and sought the assistance of Chief Schevers in helping her ward off the enemies whom she says are following her about from place to place and throwing medicine on her, causing her to lose her place of employment wherever she succeeds in finding work.

Mrs. Brown appeared in deep grief and between sobs told her story to the chief who listened kindly and then promised to do what he could in keeping the imaginary, medicine-throwing foes from tossing liquid stuff on the person of the lady with the common surname.

The woman, in tears, says she has four sons here, and is at present living herself, between Sixth and Seventh on Timea street. She told the head of the police this afternoon that a well known teacher in one of the public schools had thrown the last medicine on her. White vitrol was the "medicine" Mrs. Brown said had been thrown on her as she worked.

The woman in distress, has been working at various hotels and boarding houses and says that for the past ten years, enemies have been following her about treating her clothes with applications of medicines that causes employers to dismiss her from service the moment they smell the materia medica.


