

WAS FIRST OF LOCK-MASTERS

Sudden Death of James M. Cody, Saturday Morning, Removed One of Best Known Citizens.

FUNERAL IS TOMORROW

Body of Deceased Found in Stairway Leading to Cellar From Engine Room at Ten O'clock.

Many friends of James M. Cody were surprised and shocked Saturday morning when they learned that the first lock-master had died suddenly while attending to his duties in the engine room in the lockage apartments of the canal.

Mr. Cody's body was found at the entrance of the opening to the cellar of the stone building which stands a hundred yards from the government engineer's office.

On the arrival of the coroner, a jury composed of Edward Vaughan, William Steele and William Kilroy was empaneled, but a post mortem examination was thought necessary.

When Mr. Cody left his home Saturday morning for the lock, he was seemingly in good health. His death therefore came as a surprise, as he had not recently been ill, and a slight sick spell was the only indisposition he had suffered in several years.

Des Moines Canal First Master. Mr. Cody has been first-lock master since the canal was built, November 10th, 1874, assuming his duties on that date.

He was a member of the order, Catholic Knights of America, and of the St. Frances de Sales church. He was a quiet man, attending his duties with care that won him favor in the government's employ and made him one of its most valued workmen.

Born in England. James M. Cody was born in London, England, September 22, 1839, the son of Irish parents, Patrick and Mary Cody.

WILL BE TRIED FOR CONTEMPT

Fourteen Local Saloon-Keepers Hit in Action Instituted in District Court, Reviving Old Cases.

VIOLATE FOSTER DECREE

Ann Foster is Plaintiff and E. E. Meeks is Relator—Warrants Issued and \$300 Bonds Given.

Contempt proceedings instituted against fourteen Keokuk saloon-keepers in behalf of the Anti-Saloon League of Iowa, filed in the district court late Friday evening, is the latest move in the hostile campaign directed at local saloon interests.

The orders were signed by Judge D. M. Anderson at Fort Madison. Warrants were issued on the saloon men under fire, which were served by the sheriff's office. A bond in the sum of \$300 by the defendants was furnished in each instance.

In Friday's issue of The Gate City an article appeared touching with some length upon the action instituted by Ann Foster of Fort Madison and Attorney Baker of Centerville. In these cases a formal decree was granted, and with its going on record it was thought these cases had been settled for all times.


