—Union Thanksgiving services will be held at the Second Presbyterian church in West Keokuk Thursday evening at 7:30. Messrs. Williams, Lilly, McComa and perhaps other ministers will be present and deliver short addresses and take part in the service. Everybody invited.

—Fort Madison Democrat: For many years the Thanksgiving football game between the Keokuk and Fort Madison high schools at Ivanhoe park, now Peake's Amusement park, has been as eagerly looked forward to and almost as regular as the turkey itself. Both cities anxiously await the event and usually the hardest fought battle of the season on the southeastern Iowa gridirons is the annual Thanksgiving contest at Fort Madison.

—Statistics gathered from various sources by a New York medical journal shows that infantile spinal paralysis has attacked no less than 20,000 persons in the United States in the last few years. Although the mortality seldom exceeds 10 per cent, at least 75 per cent of the little victims are crippled for life. Dr. Simon Flexner, head of the Rockefeller institute, who has been studying the disease, is authority for the statement that no means to ameliorate it or prevent its development is yet known. "Those of us who have had to deal with this malady, or who have studied its unchecked progress," he says, "have come to realize how helpless we are. We know it to be epidemic. We believe it to be contagious or at least highly communicable. We have learned that there are abortive forms without paralysis. Its age incidence and sensational occurrence are known to us. We are acquainted with its terrible results. Nothing more."

—A horrible accident occurred not far from Unionville, Mo., Sunday morning about 4:00 o'clock when two young girls were thrown from a buggy and killed. Two young couples, Clyde and Theny Baquet, and sister, Clarence Fullerton and Lola Powell, were returning from a dance at the home of Blanche Cooley, four miles southeast of Unionville, when the horses became frightened in some manner and ran away throwing the occupants out, not injuring Fullerton but knocking Baquet senseless and breaking the neck of Miss Powell, whose death resulted instantly and crushing the skull of Miss Baquet, who died in the arms of her brother shortly after he became conscious. All of them are well known in Unionville. Miss Powell's parents lived north of Unionville but she stayed in town and was employed by Dr. Holman. The other unfortunate young lady lived in the town. They were 19 and 20 years old.

—Burlington Hawk-Eye: The saloon contempt cases were brought up yesterday morning in the district court when arguments were heard covering the motion to dismiss the cases. M. S. Odle, of Des Moines, represented the plaintiff Reusch, of Mediapolis, and Poor & Poor appeared for Jos. Koch; Charles Willner for Newwohner & Striegel, and S. K. Tracy and F. E. Thompson, for Joseph McCabe. Attorney B. P. Poor delivered lengthy arguments to the court, holding that more specific charges must be brought. That there was simply a belief expressed that the defendants had violated the court's decree. There was no responsible charge. Mr. Poor cited numerous cases bearing upon the three local actions. He delivered an able argument. Attorney M. S. Odle was heard, and Attorney S. K. Tracy also made arguments. At the conclusion Judge Withrow took the motion to dismiss under advisement. The saloon and drug store injunction cases will be heard next Saturday morning, when the motions for more specific statements will be argued.
