

# GREAT CHANCE TO LEARN SWIMMING

Unprecedented Opportunity Extended to Men and Boys of Keokuk to Be Taught by a Leading Expert.

## Y. M. C. A. AUSPIQUES

Known as Swimming Campaign and Will Commence in Keokuk Next Week—School Men Indorse Move.

The physical committee of the Y. M. C. A. has secured the services of H. H. Corsan of New York City, to conduct a swimming campaign in Keokuk during the week beginning December 5.

Mr. Corsan is employed by the international committee of the Y. M. C. A., and is famed out to associations over the country to teach boys to swim. He is an expert in his line, and has been unusually successful in this work during his employment as instructor. Mr. Corsan has been instrumental in teaching 30,000 the art of swimming during the past three years. This swimming campaign will be open to every boy and man in Keokuk. Any boy over twelve years of age is qualified to membership.

A committee will start out tomorrow morning to visit the men of the city who are interested in the movement for the purpose of selling tickets, entitling the holder to six lessons under the especial supervision of Mr. Corsan. Any man who wishes to be called on by this committee is asked to telephone the association office and the committee will visit him subsequently at the earliest possible moment. If enough of these tickets are sold to back the movement sufficiently, the cost to the boy will be absolutely nothing.

Superintendent Wm. Aldrich and Principal R. L. Reid have announced that they will co-operate with the movement, for they realize that the movement is one intended for the betterment of the boys of Keokuk.

In this connection, however, it should be said that the present movement is not one confined to Keokuk alone, but is one that has been taken up by associations throughout the country with great success.

The classes will be taught by Mr. Corsan in the Y. M. C. A. swimming pool, which is one of the finest for its size in the country. Not in recent years have the boys and men of Keokuk been presented with such an opportunity to learn swimming as will be afforded during the coming visit of the New York expert.

Mr. Corsan will be assisted by an able corps of local swimmers. In addition to his work in the actual instructions, he will give instructive talks, if necessary.

## CUBANS WELCOME AMERICAN CAPITAL

Colony Started Just After the Spanish War Is Thriving and Prosperous.

The work of improving the channel between Nuevitas and Guanaja bays is being energetically pushed by the Cuban government. A powerful dredge is now at work in the Sabinal canal, which connects these two bays, and it is expected that the channel will be opened so as to permit the passage of small steamers by the summer of 1911. The work is in charge of Mr. Ignacio Agramonte, chief engineer of Samaguey Province. Mr. Agramonte was educated in the United States, and is heartily in sympathy with the effort being made by the Americans to develop the fertile lands which have been so long neglected by the Cubans.

The prime object in improving the Sabinal canal is to afford better transportation facilities to the large and growing American colony of La Gloria, which is situated in the Cubitas valley fronting on Guanaja Bay, about fifty miles west of the harbor of Nuevitas. La Gloria was the first American colonization enterprise in the island of Cuba after the close of the Spanish war, having been started by Cuban Land & Steamship company of No. 32 Broadway, New York City, in 1899. From a small beginning it has grown to be a thriving and prosperous community, having a population of over one thousand English speaking people, with churches, Cuban and American schools, stores, saw mill and various shops. The principal industry is the growing of grape fruit, oranges and other varieties of citrus fruit. Over three thousand acres have been cleared and are now in groves, many of which have been bearing for several years and producing fruit of a quality equal to the best products of Florida and California. La Gloria grape fruit is considered by many as far superior to any grown in the United States. The abundant rainfall in Cuba obviates the necessity of irrigation, and the rich soil in the Cubitas valley requires no fertilization. These two principal items of expense in raising citrus fruit in California can be placed in the profit column by the La Gloria fruit grower. Cuba is also absolutely free from any danger by frosts.

The Cuban government has for some time been taking a lively interest in this thriving little settlement and has constructed a telford macadam highway connecting the town with the bay, a distance of four and one-half miles. The cost of this road was about \$85,000 and the improvement of the Sabinal canal will, it is estimated, amount to nearly \$100,000 more. There has been much talk about the Cubans being unfriendly to the Americans, but the interest taken by the Cuban government in this American settlement is proof to the contrary. Legitimate American investment is favored by the thinking Cuban, and where Americans are making good, as they are at La Gloria the Cuban government is ready to extend a helping hand. The work of the Americans at La Gloria means much to Cuba. It is opening up one of the most fertile sections of the island, heretofore lying idle and unproductive, and the Cubans are not slow to appreciate its value.

## ADVERTISING A CITY AND WHY

Reasons for a Municipality Keeping Itself Advertising Publicly.

Why should a city advertise? Is there any reason that has a basis in dollars and cents why a city should plan and carry out a campaign of publicity? Does it make any difference to the business men and other residents of a city whether the people throughout the country are told of the opportunities for business in that place? Is it not rather a kind of philanthropic enterprise that really benefits the men who are attracted by the advertising more than it benefits those who started the advertising campaign? In other words, what are the effects of persistently and widely advertising a city?

The first effect of advertising a city is just the same as the first effect in advertising a business. It brings people to the city to see what there is there. When the strangers come it is then up to the people of that city, just as it is up to the management of a store, to make the strangers feel at home. The visitors should be received courteously, should be shown about and should be made to realize that the city stands prepared to make good every assertion contained in its advertising. The effect is to make a stranger realize that it would be pleasant and profitable to live in that city. His decision to move is a natural result.

When strangers come into a city and buy real estate, they thus increase the value of all real estate in that city. Demand and supply regulate the price of everything else. When there is a strong demand for a city's real estate prices go up. The home people, owners of real estate, thereby directly profit from the advertising that has produced this outside demand for the city's property.

Again by attracting new business enterprises of all kinds, the campaign of publicity will increase the incomes from real estate. When more factories or business

houses are brought to a city the opportunities for employment at good wages increase. This is a result of municipal publicity which directly concerns the workmen. The opportunities for employment are much better in a growing and expanding city than in a dead one.

The established business man, the retail merchant, has a better opportunity as a city that is advertising because as the city grows in population his opportunity for increased sales also increases.

These are a few reasons—business reasons—why it is profitable for cities to conduct campaigns of publicity. There is just one thing to bear in mind, however, and that is that a campaign of publicity lasting one year or two years will not work a miracle. If a city would be known as alive and progressive, if it would accelerate its growth permanently, its plans for publicity should be made so that the campaign of advertising, in whatever form it may take, will extend over a number of years. It should be persistent, thorough and definite. The ultimate result then will be worth the trouble and effort.
