ROUTINE BUSINESS IN DISTRICT COURT

Warner Entered Plea of Not Guilty When Arraigned This Afternoon at Two O'clock.

ANDERSON TRIAL IS ON

Selection of Jury From Panel of Twenty-Four Talesmen—Litigation in The Grimsley Case.

Nels Warner was arraigned at two o'clock this afternoon. The defendant entered a plea of not guilty to the charge of assault with intent to kill Henry Sanders, proprietor of the Grand hotel. After change of venue from the superior court, the case against Warner was dismissed in the court of Justice James Burrows, but was again presented to the grand jury while in session, and an indictment was returned against Warner. At 2 o'clock today, also began the Abe Anderson trial, the colored man who killed Moses Jordan, a farmer, a number of months ago, being brought before the court in session at that hour. The major portion of the time was taken up with the drawing of a jury from the twenty-four talesmen named yesterday.

Grimsley Matter During Day.
 Yesterday and today close litigation of the Grimsley insanity matter was pursued, in an effort to determine the mental condition of Mrs. Louisa Grimsley. A number of witnesses were on the stand, including the attorneys for the defense.

Empanelling Anderson Jury.
 At 2 o'clock this afternoon, Abe Anderson, alleged murderer of Moses Jordan, was arraigned. Work of empanelling the jury was commenced shortly after the hour set, Judge Smythe opening the session.

The court room was filled to almost overflow by spectators, among them a number of colored onlookers. Anderson entered the court room, his huge frame looking none the worse for his many months in jail.

County Attorney Craig announced to the jury drawn by the clerk, the cause for their appearance. The first 12 names drawn from the box and questioned by the attorneys were: D. W. Bishop, Jacob Ludwig, Jno. W. Glassford, R. J. Lange, Jas. B. Gambrel, Harvey Johnson, W. E. Strimback, Nell McCaffrey, Joe Jeffries, S. G. French, Jno. Lourie, R. H. Holt.

HOW KEOKUK'S POOR WILL BE HELPED

Those in Need to Be Assisted Through Sunday School Classes At Christmas Time.

County Postmaster Fred Korschgen has prepared a list of the city's needy ones, fifty-six in all, and this list is to be given to the various Sunday schools of the different denominational churches of the city. The teachers of Sabbath school classes and scholars may take from this list at random, the names of those whom they wish to help. In this way there will be no "doubling," and the ones chosen will be checked off.

This new plan is expected to prove acceptable and facilitate the work of the givers at Christmas time. Every one will be provided for and on one will be overlooked.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 8.—A delegation representing the gulf to the Lal deep waterways convention headed by W. K. Kavanaugh, called at the white house today to present to President Taft the resolutions adopted at the recent meeting urging the 14 foot channel from Chicago to New Orleans. The executive received the resolutions and said to Kavanaugh: "I was on the bench long enough to know that the judge must sit on the bench and listen to the pleadings of any man even though he was abusing the court at the corner grocery." Kavanaugh attacked President Taft in the St. Louis convention.

Fatality at Grandview.
 GRANDVIEW, Dec. 8.—George Waiters, Jr., a farmer, was instantly killed by a fall from the top of a hay barn on his place, to the ground. His neck was broken and his skull fractured. He leaves a wife and three children.

19 Were Injured.
 SPRINGFIELD, Ill. Dec. 8.—A rear end collision a few miles east of here this morning on the "urban road, injured nineteen people.

COLORED PEOPLE TRADES SCHOOL

Rev. G. H. McDaniel, D. D., General Financial Agent for the Enterprise Institution of Chicago in the City.

TEACHES MANY TRADES

Appeals to the People to Help a Degrading Institution—One That is Doing Much Good for His Race.

Rev. G. H. McDaniel, D. D., the founder, president and general financial agent for Enterprise Institute, a general trades school in Chicago, for the colored people of the middle west, is in Keokuk in the interest of his school.

Dr. McDaniel is favorably known throughout the west and is highly commended by prominent ministers and citizens and also the religious and secular press. He is universally regarded as a man of unusual attainments but the success with which his work is being attended is due to his admirable fitness for the position he occupies, for whether in private or public, he always evinces that deep and unselfish interest in his cause that naturally begets sympathy and impels those who can to help him.

Wants \$5,000.
 Last year there were thirty-one persons graduated but the volume of work was equal to seventy-five persons. Each graduated in a single course.

Dr. McDaniel says the success of those who have gone out from his school so encourages him that he is undertaking to put in an additional department and teachers that will cost \$5,000, for the year 1911. It is on this account that he is prosecuting a vigorous campaign for funds.

The marvelous success of Tuskegee is due to co-operation upon the part of the public as well as to the master mind of Dr. Washington. The negro population is rapidly increasing throughout the north, and Chicago alone has from 60,000 to 75,000 of them. Industrial education for the many thousands of "grown ups" who are not eligible to the public schools must be provided through those special and independent institutions such as Enterprise Institute which is interdenominational and is open both day and night for the benefit of those who are anxious to increase their learning capacity.

An Iowa Product.

President McDaniel is an Iowa product and hopes that Keokuk churches and citizens will give him even more generously than they have in the past, thus recognizing and encouraging the growth of the institution. It is said that the enrollment last year was about 160. Increased facilities will increase the attendance until thousands are thereby prepared for their life work and useful citizenship.

The Great Need.

Dr. Edmund J. James, president of the University of Illinois, said recently: "In no other nation claiming to be civilized is there at the present time so large a population in such educational degradation as the American negro. No other population equally numerous is to be found within the limits of any civilized nation so deprived of educational facilities and opportunities."

Booker T. Washington says: "You of the north should do all that Christian people can to help the negro. He learns rapidly and is grateful for all that is done to better his condition in life."

Whenever the negro is helped in the south or in the north, we help ourselves and forward the conditions that make for the common weal—the good of whites and blacks, native born and immigrant.

FIRE UNDER BED ROOM FLOORING

Rickards Home at Sixth and Morgan Street Threatened Near Noon Hour by Blaze on Second Floor.

DEFECTIVE FLUE CAUSE

Damage to Wood Fixtures, Furniture and Other Articles About Two Hundred Dollars.

A deliveryman of the DeYoung grocery store noticed smoke coming from the windows of the G. V. S. Rickards residence at 602 Morgan street this morning at 11:30 and turned in an alarm of fire. The department responded and through quick and concerted efforts the blaze, which might have destroyed the comfortable home was squelched before it had done any more damage than burning a large portion of the floor in an upstairs front bed room, and about fifteen feet of flooring in the hall on the second floor.

A defective flue was the cause of the blaze sparks escaping between the first and second floors and eating into the timbers between three joists beneath the bed room floor. Floor covering and an upholstered red chair were the only articles burnt besides the flooring, and Chief Anderson estimated the damage at \$200 this afternoon.

Portions of the floor had to be torn up to get at the fire and the chemical application soaked into the blaze. A hole about two feet square was burned in the ceiling beneath the upstairs hall, otherwise the fire did not get through, and no water found its way into the lower floor.

The quick and efficient work of the department was appreciated, and fortunately the efforts of the firemen in confining the blaze to the area where it originated, were successful.
