COURT GIGGLES AT KEOKUKIAN'S BUN

"Cy" Rockwell, the Quaint Old Figure Known to Many Here, Caused a Stir Before St. Louis Judge.

HAD HIS HAIR DONE UP

Reports Said it Was as Neat as Any Hairdresser Could Have Done it—Some Side Lights on Our Hero.

When George E. ("Cy") Rockwell, a picturesque figure known by nearly everyone in Keokuk twenty or more years ago and whose familiarity here is rekindled yet by frequent visits to the city, went into Judge Lee's court in St. Louis the other day to contest his wife's suit for divorce he had a bun on. No one suspected it until he removed the broad fedora hat. Then the bun stood forth as Rockwell's crowning glory.

A St. Louis paper says that it was as neat and compact a bun as a professional hairdresser could have arranged. The coiled braids, neatly plaited, were all in their proper place and were held together with little hair pins. Women spectators and divorce seekers giggled and the bailiff rapped for order.

A Few Side Lights.

Before plunging into a review of Rockwell's connubial entanglements and his subsequent divorce last week a few words about Rockwell himself would not be amiss. When he lived in Keokuk Rockwell was known as one of the smoothest fakirs in the business, being given much to taking short jaunts with circuses, side shows and the like. On one occasion—the time when Sells Bros. visited Keokuk some years ago—Rockwell was presented by the management with a cross-eyed, lantern-jawed camel. Rockwell took his "pet" down into Missouri and made a piece of change exhibiting it at various Missouri towns.

When the city built the big sewer it passed under his home on South Second street. Because of the building of it damage resulted to his cistern and a lawsuit followed which dragged through the courts for a long time, placing it in almost the same category with the well known Grimmsley case, still before the public.

Rockwell owns a stable in St. Louis and it still serves as a meeting place for a number of well known characters who have drifted to that city in the past twenty years. Rockwell was in Keokuk only a month ago, still wearing the bun under his wide fedora.

Judge Calls Case.

Ignoring the audible comments, says a St. Louis paper, the man with his hair done up advanced to the stand and sank languidly into the witness chair. Judge Lee, who had summoned him into court, questioned him.

"You are the defendant in an action for divorce brought by Sina Rockwell, he said. "She has testified that you required her to live in a



stable with four horses, a pig, five dogs and a goat. What answer have you to make?"

"What's in it?" asked Judge Lee. "A folding bed and a lot of junk," said Inman. "The stable is so unsanitary that I wouldn't keep one of my horses in it."

Judge Lee, on this corroboration of Mrs. Rockwell's testimony, granted a divorce to her.
