Bingen is almost a century since Springfield (Mass.) Fish and Game clubs want a quail hatchery.

An all-Indian cricket eleven will visit England next summer.

Syracuse university may adopt graduate system of foot ball coaching. Stanford university is to have an \$8,000 training house.

Missouri horse breeders are to organize.

Minnesota university track athletes will make ice skating a part of their training exercises.

Connecticut may shut down on game bird hunting for the next three years.

Columbia, Missouri, and Annapolis are the latest to announce the construction of stadiums.

Vancouver board of trade subscribed \$2,000 to send a team of six men to the American bowling tournament to be held in St. Louis in January.

Jack Lester, who Tommy Burns thinks may become the heavy weight boxing champion, has been matched to box Pete Muldoon in Tacoma, January 10.

Bingen, Peter the Great, Todd, John P. Gentry, McKinney, Moko and Allerton had fifteen or more new 2:30 performers in 1910.

Michigan students include Allen Garrels, brother of Johnny Garrels, and Jimmy Craig, brother of Ralph C. Craig, the intercollegiate 220-yard champion, to perpetuate their brothers' names in athletics.

Many of the Rugby football players of the Pacific coast college keep in shape by playing association football during the closed season.

Saranac Lake, N. Y., will hold the ice skating championships on January 24, 25 and 26. Montreal will have a series of contests beginning January 30 and closing February 4.

Harry L. Coe, better known as "Spider" Coe, the former University of Michigan one-mile runner, may join the Boston Athletic association.

An English-style, billiard tournament for the championship of the state of Rhode Island is being held at Saylesville, with fourteen competitors.

Alfred Shrubbs and Tom Longboat are to run sixteen miles in Buffalo on January 23. They will run a sixteen mile race in Boston the latter part of January. Shrubbs wants Longboat to go to England in February, where he thinks they could attract a 20,000 crowd in a race.

"One Round" Jack Hogan, the 21-year-old lightweight of San Francisco, has eighteen knockouts to his credit, and he is regarded as a most promising pugilist. Hogan has yet to lose a bout in the thirty-three contests he has engaged in, only three of his opponents having secured draws with him.

Marquette university of Milwaukee has instituted the system of student management of athletics, and the managers of the various branches of sport have been elected and will be directly accountable to the faculty directors. The managers will also be members of the board of control and will represent the student body at meetings of that body.

Twelve of the thirty-three colleges and universities having clubs in the National Rifle association have entered teams in the Round Robin league for the winter. The contests will begin week ending January 7 and there will be one match a week. It is made up of eastern colleges.

The first intercollegiate aviation contest will be held next spring. Harvard and Columbia Aero clubs are building machines of original type, with which they hope to win. Harvard has the biplane which James V. Martin built and Columbia is pinning its faith in the Philip Wilcox machine.
