THREE EYE LEAGUE MEETING TODAY

Magnates Will Gather in Chicago in One of Most Important Sessions in History of Organization

QUINCY TO GET IN?

That City Believes That Berth is Open and General Prediction is That Waterloo is to be Ousted.

QUINCY, Ill., Jan. 4.—When President Al. Tearney raps his gavel for order today in Chicago it will be the signal for the opening of one of the biggest battles ever waged within the lines of any minor baseball league—and there have been some big ones.

Three-Eye league meetings in the past, in fact since its organization, have been noted for the scraps which occurred, and it now appears that before the final bonds which have held the league together for these years are broken the bitterest struggle of all will occur.

Waterloo is making its last stand; the promoters have worked themselves into a frenzy of protest, and the leading men of the city will be in the Windy City to back the Booster aggressive against the field. Standing back of them Dubuque looms large and not a little formidable. The interests of both cities are wrapped in the same package, and if one is ousted from the Three-Eye circuit the other can but wait for the axe to fall.

On the eve of the battle President Tearney has issued a statement that he anticipates the biggest fight in Three-Eye history, but he is probably prepared for it. Back of him stands a majority of the league directors, and there seems to be slight cause for serious doubt as to the final outcome.

President Harry F. Jofor, representing Quincy's interests, went to Chicago Monday night. He was there yesterday and has by this time felt the pulse of the league. What his diagnosis is no one has learned as yet, but by the close of today's session there will be something tangible and something interesting.
