





continued with as much enthusiasm

as ever since it was commenced a

couple of weeks before Christmas. Ice

harvesters do not interfere in their

work of cutting up the smooth surface

of the big government ditch yet so that

the pleasure on steel runners keeps on

unalloyed.

—"Gentleman" John Fowler, known

as one of the smoothest and most

dangerous forgers that ever plundered

banks in the United States, was ar-

rested by Des Moines detectives yes-

terday. A confession involving for-

geries perpetrated upon a dozen Iowa

banks was made. The plan as worked

by Fowler was to forge a check for

\$18. This check he would deposit in

a bank, drawing out \$8 in cash at

the time and securing a depositor's

book which showed a balance of \$10

to his credit. He would purchase

small articles in stores, offering as

payment forged checks for a small

amount, \$6 or \$8. If his credit was

questioned, he allowed an inspection

of his bank book and invited the bus-

ness house to inquire at the bank if

his check was good.

—Boarding house keepers and

those having rooms for rent will find

that they can secure all the boarders

they want by spring. Yesterday a

force of eighteen expert crib builders

arrived in the city and were busy

looking for boarding places. As fast

as possible the skilled workmen will

be cared for. Keokuk is glad to wel-

come this element as the men spend

their money here, many of them will

have families come, and for a period

of three years and more this city will

be the home of a large number of

skilled laborers and workmen. Not

many weeks will elapse until the

force of workmen will have increased

to more than a thousand, and citizens

will realize more fully the swell in the

list of workmen who will make their

homes here and on the other side of

the river during the work of dam con-

struction.



—The Wapello county board of su-

pervisors decided yesterday that the

saloon consent petition was void by a

majority of nineteen signatures. A big

fight on the consent petition has been

waged in Ottumwa.

—A force of linemen are busy con-

structing an underground conduit for

wires on South Fifth street, from

Johnson street, south. Work of tear-

ing up the pavement and digging the

trenches was commenced yesterday.

—The cold weather of the first

part of the week has made most ex-

cellent ice in the river, and the entire

length of the upper Mississippi is now

alive with ice cutters. Thousands of

tons are being stored away in hun-

dreds of ice houses, and hauled to in-

land cities. The most novel sight

along the entire river is that near

Port Madison, where gangs of con-

victs from the penitentiary, under

guard are busy cutting and hauling

ice to replenish the state penitentiary

ice houses.

—The recent police order to the

owners of bowling alleys and pool

halls, to eliminate the "kiddish" ele-

ment from their places of business did

not effect as generally as it was

thought. The officers do not intend

to inform the pool room operators

again that they are disobeying the

law, but prosecutions will follow

shortly. Several weeks ago it will

be remembered, Chief Schavers in-

formed the amusement hall men that

minors would not be allowed in their

places, but boys from twelve and thir-

teen years of age up to sixteen and sev-

enteen, too small to play pool, continue

to hang out in them.
