—Read The Daily Gate City. —Today the works of the water power construction on both sides of the river will be visited by hundreds of persons interested in the progress that has been made. The workmen having a holiday, sight seers may gaze undisturbed and without fear of impeding the work of others in taking in the situation, which is piling up into something and beginning to take on a real dam look. The interurban will do a rushing business all day long, and new paths will be worn between the first and second locks on the Iowa side.

—One of the best and most effective ways to advertise Keokuk would be in the nature of a folder presenting the water power and data concerning the enterprise and the city in general. A picture of the dam should be on the title page and information concerning this immense proposition following in concise statements. It would be a most effective method of presenting Keokuk and its possibilities to the country.

Keokuk Not on the List For Spring Games of White Sox Teams.

[Gate City Leased Wire Service.] CHICAGO, Jan. 7.—Announcement that two teams of the White Sox, after their spring training at Mineral Wells, Texas, will entertain the residents of eight states on their way north for the first league game April 12, was made here tonight. The Sox will leave for Texas, February 28th, and during March will play in five cities of the Texas league. On March 25 the two teams, the first under Manager Duffey and Owner Comiskey and the second under "Doc" White, will start north. Their itinerary will be as follows:

Team No. 1: Oklahoma City, March 25 and 26; Wichita, March 27; Topeka, March 28 and 29; St. Joseph, Mo., 29 and 31; Kansas City, April 1 and 2; Hannibal, Mo., April 3; Quincy, Ill., April 4; Danville, Ill., April 6; Terre Haute, April 7 and Indianapolis April 8, 9 and 10.

Team No. 2: Wichita, March 25 and 26; Topeka March 27; St. Joseph March 28 and 29; Lincoln, Neb., March 30 and 31; Omaha, April 1 and 2; Sioux City, Iowa, April 3 and 4; Omaha, April 5; Lincoln, April 6 and 7; Des Moines, April 8; Ottumwa, Iowa, April 9; Rock Island, Ill., April 10 and Peoria, April 11.

## NO ICE FAMINE NEXT SUMMER

Plenty of the Good Cold Stuff for Keokuk People and Harvester Are Busy Cutting it.

### ONE COMPANY IS OUT

Work of Tearing Down 7,000 Capacity Houses of Mississippi Coal and Ice Co. About Completed.

There will be plenty of ice next summer.

The foregoing assertion was made by a prominent dealer of Keokuk yesterday afternoon, who has handled the product for the past thirty years.

Ice will not be increased in price on account of the yield being sufficient to guarantee it, still from 20 to 25 cents per hundred pounds.

Although not as good in quality as the ice last season which was thirteen and sometimes fifteen inches thick, the harvest this season will be a good one and those employing cutters and teams are unable to get enough men to handle the cut. As a result the season will be lengthened several weeks if cold weather holds. Already hundreds of tons have been stored away in the big houses which are scattered along the bank of the canal all the way to Galland.

In the north, the ice harvest is practically over and the season has been a good one, thousands of tons of pure channel ice having been stored.

Who Are Cutting Here. Tucker & McManus and the S. P. Pond company are cutting on the lower level of the canal, that is, below the second lock. Above the second lock, Azinger, Becker, Denmore and John Noonan are harvesting a good yield with men and teams. The ice averages nine and ten inches in thickness.

The Mississippi Coal and Ice company will not cut any ice this winter, it is believed. J. B. Hutchinson having stated yesterday that on account of tearing down the company's ice houses below and above the second lock, a harvest would be impossible this year. The water power company having taken over the three ice houses, the two above the first lock of seven thousand ton capacity and the one near the water works, there is no place for storage.

Captain Hutchinson says that work will commence immediately on the construction of a three-hundred ton ice house which will be sufficient to store what will be needed to tide over next summer and by fall a larger house for the company will have been built at a point of vantage near the ice fields.

Work of tearing down the old Mississippi Coal and Ice company's houses to make room for water power progress and work was commenced the first of the year and has been nearly completed.
