
JUDGEMENT FOR KEOKUK BUTCHER

Judge McPherson of the Federal Court Found for Frank J. Ewers in Oleomargarine Matter.

CASE WAS NOVEL ONE

H. O. Weaver, Internal Revenue Collector of Burlington, Erred When He Charged Wholesale Tax.

In the case of Frank J. Ewers, the local butcher, vs. H. O. Weaver, collector of internal revenue, tried before Judge McPherson in the federal court, judgment in the sum of \$106.00 with interest, has been granted the plaintiff. The order was received by Deputy Clerk Wahlgren Saturday afternoon and placed on file. The judge ordered that no execution should issue against H. O. Weaver personally, but that it should be paid as a claim against the United States. This suit was a novel one and was filed in the federal court here on October 1. Early in January the plaintiff, Frank J. Ewers, was temporarily out of oleomargarine and borrowed from his brother, A. P. J. Ewers, a licensed
