Financial Statement of the City is Out Showing Comfortable Balance in Bank.

INTEREST ON DEPOSITS

Several Hundred Dollars Has Been Realized Since April by Money Earnings, That Will Help Out.

Saturday City Clerk Sandberg, issued his monthly statement of Keokuk's monied standing, which shows the city to have a total of \$21,808.41

In the bank. Several hundred dollars in interest have accumulated since the plan of placing money in the banking institutions on interest was adopted by the commissioners at the commencement of their administration last April.

The expense for the fire department's maintenance during the month of December was \$1,111.19. The police took more than \$900 during the month just passed, of the taxpayers' dough.

The superior court, as will be noticed, turned in more than \$353 to the city's cash box during the ultimate month. The report of receipts and disbursements appears subsequently:

"Graustark"

"Graustark," the dramatization by Geo. D. Baker, of George Barr McCutcheon's novel of the same title, comes to the Grand opera house this evening.

This is one of the big theatrical successes of years. The play teems with heart interest. All its absorbing situations revolve around the love affairs of the Princess Yevette of "Graustark," and Grenfall Lorry, a wealthy, dashing, handsome young American.

The artists engaged in the interpretation of the different characters are thoroughly fitted for the parts they are portraying, each having been carefully selected for their capabilities.
