

ONE GRIMSLEY CASE IS ENDED

Supreme Court Decision in the Case of E. T. Bartruff vs. Wm. Sinton, Guardian, is Dismissed.

CASE STARTED IN 1904

Resulted in Judge McNamara Declining Against Mrs. Grimsley From Which an Appeal Was Taken.

One of the famous Grimsley cases has finally gone by the boards. A decision of the supreme court of the state was received yesterday in which the motion to dismiss the appeal in the case of E. T. Bartruff vs. William Sinton, guardian, was sustained. On June 1, of the past year Judge W. L. McNamara of the superior court, refused to grant a new trial in the former case of Bartruff vs. Grimsley in which Sinton appeared as guardian and contended that the defendant was entitled to a rehearing of the case because she was insane. With this application denied, the appeal was taken to the supreme court only to be denied.

This case can be traced back to 1904 when E. T. Bartruff brought suit against Mrs. Grimsley to oust her from her Morgan street property. The jury found for Bartruff, the case being tried before Judge McNamara in the superior court. Attorney Hughes applied for a new trial, which was granted, this being in equity. Mrs. Grimsley again lost and subsequent appeal to the supreme court was dismissed.

On May 4, 1909 William Sinton was appointed guardian and asked that the former judgments and decrees be set aside on the grounds that Mrs. Grimsley was insane and incapable to understand the nature of the proceedings.

The telegram telling of the decision was received yesterday afternoon by Attorney Frank M. Ballinger, author of the motion to dismiss the case.

When the new home is finished a plan will in all probability be carried out to make Thursday ladies' day at the club. This has proved to be a very popular feature with the Iowa City lodge.

—Men who have been identified with water power enterprises, such as Keokuk is receiving, only on a small scale, say that in every case the power plants have practically built the cities in which they are located. This statement comes from men employed in construction, and not from the investors, who might give out a prejudiced view. The investigation as to what effect power plants have had reveals a corroboration of the statement as to their industrial value. A gentleman who arrived in this city yesterday, thoroughly acquainted with such enterprises, says that the Keokuk plant will revolutionize this city, and he knows of no place in the country where opportunities are so plentiful and so assured as they are here.

Marshall, who were appointed by the board of supervisors as the expert examiners of the county's books, are at work at the Fort Madison court house auditing the clerk's books. George Fuchs and Fred Sochtig appointed from Fort Madison, will begin their work on the 16th.

—Keokuk, like all the other cities in the state, is interested in the movement started by the daily newspaper men to prevail upon the state legislature to pass a bill appropriating a fund which shall be used to advertise the state, the object being to prevent any further loss in population Iowa is certainly a state good enough in all respects to be liberally and effectively advertised.

—Winter goods go at reduced prices next week at Central store.

—W. R. C. Kendrick and wife have conveyed to Robert Ferris, Jr., six acres of land on the middle road.

—The newly elected officers of Harmony lodge No. 5, Degree of Honor, Ft. Madison, will be installed this evening by Mrs. Lillian Moore and the officers of Lotus Lodge No. 25, this city. A number of ladies from this city, members of the Degree of Honor, will be the guests at a social affair in the Degree of Honor lodge rooms there tonight.

—A Nauvoo press notice of recent date, says that property in the Mormon City is soaring sky-high as a result of the recent boom in water power dam building. In the same article it is also said that those who own islands in the river opposite the city of Nauvoo are waiting for the Water Power Company to come along and make them an offer for the small bodies in the Mississippi, on account of the overflow which will occur.

—News has been received of the death of Rev. Father Mathias Hannon, of Burlington, Wis., where he had served as a priest for thirty-five years. Father Hannon was in the fifty-ninth year of his priesthood at the time of his death, and was the first Catholic clergyman in Iowa. He was one of the picturesque characters who helped to make history in Iowa in the early days. He traveled about Iowa carrying his vestments in his saddlebags, and was the first priest to celebrate mass in Des Moines, Ft. Dodge and many other Iowa cities. His clerical education was obtained in Ireland and later at Notre Dame, Indiana. He was ordained in December, 1852, and his first appointment was at Iowa City.

—Odd shirt waists go at big reductions at Central's big sale.

—Judge Henry Bank will sign an order at his home today, setting March 14, the second day of the March term of the district court, as the time on which the petit jurors shall appear. Unless a special order is made by court this body is summoned to appear on the second Tuesday of the term. There will be a large amount of jury work to dispose of during the next term and for this reason the judge wishes to get busy as early as possible. The extra amount of jury business will be occasioned because of a peculiar situation which developed during the last term, when it was impossible to secure a jury. With the opening of court more than two months off attorneys have filed only two new suits.

—In the cases against Burlington drug stores instituted by attorneys for the Anti-Saloon league an amended petition has been filed, saying: "Comes now the plaintiff and in accordance with the order of the court herein amends his petition as follows to wit: 'That the said defendant has kept intoxicating liquors in his said place of business with the intent to sell the same in violation of law by reason of the fact that he has not required all applicants for liquor to sign a request for the same, but has delivered said liquor without having any request signed by the applicants.'"

—Burlington Gazette. Herman Ruckebrod, fireman at the High school heating plant, residing at 1209 Stowe street, saved the life of a young woman at the risk of his own yesterday afternoon by dragging her from the railroad track, directly in front of train No. 6, the Burlington's fast passenger that arrives from the west at 2:30 o'clock. The rescue was effected just this side of the culvert near the Murray Iron works, while a dozen spectators breathlessly watched the thrilling act. It was a long chance that Ruckebrod took, but he never hesitated, running at top speed towards the girl, grabbing her and pulling her to one side as the heavy passenger train rolled by, sparks flying from every wheel under the pressure of the brake shoes, caused by the engineer's attempt at an emergency stop. Still holding the half fainting form of the girl in his arms, Ruckebrod flattened himself against the walls of the Murray Iron works boiler shop and when the danger was past, went on his way as if he had done nothing out of the ordinary.



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
