

MORE SCHEDULES FOR THE CENTRAL

No. 2 and No. 3 Received Today by President Justice and Both Look to be Fairly Good.

KEOKUK LIKES MILEAGE

Has Only to Travel 2,015 Miles, While Distance for Other Cities is Proportionately Lower.

Schedule No. 2 calls for 130 games. The mileage is as follows:

Keokuk	2015
Hannibal	2610
Ottumwa	2240
Muscatine	2105
Burlington	1790
Monmouth	1980
Galesburg	1835
Kewanee	2120

Distribution of Games. Keokuk, Ottumwa, Hannibal and Muscatine are given two holidays and the other cities one each. All of the clubs have nine Sunday games at home.

Keokuk opens at Burlington, Muscatine at Kewanee, Hannibal at Monmouth and Ottumwa at Galesburg. The season opens on May 3 and closes on Labor Day. In several instances two clubs play four and five games in a stretch, this being one of the points of objection that will likely be raised to the chart.

Decoration Day—Kewanee at Burlington, Galesburg at Monmouth, Hannibal at Muscatine and Keokuk at Ottumwa.

July 4—Ottumwa at Keokuk, Muscatine at Hannibal, Burlington at Kewanee and Monmouth at Galesburg.

Labor Day—Galesburg at Keokuk, Burlington at Ottumwa, Monmouth at Muscatine and Kewanee at Hannibal.

Chart No. 3.

In the third schedule submitted no mileage for the clubs is given, the author stating in his letter to President Justice that the clubs always insist in figuring the mileage themselves.

In this schedule the opening is somewhat different. Keokuk opens at Burlington, Hannibal at Ottumwa, Monmouth at Muscatine and Muscatine at Galesburg.

Decorations Day games—Galesburg at Keokuk, Kewanee at Hannibal, Ottumwa at Muscatine and Burlington at Monmouth.

July 4—Muscatine at Burlington, Ottumwa at Galesburg, Kewanee at Keokuk, Monmouth at Kewanee.

Other schedules are expected in a few days, as several other makers are at work preparing their charts. It is believed that the fact that the makers are not put under close restrictions some of the best schedules the league has ever had will be submitted to a vote of the directors.

Men Rushed to Work.

The K and W passenger train which followed ten minutes later was held up by the accident and the passengers were transferred across the bridge as were other passengers during the day.

The temporary wagon bridge which extends for about one hundred and twenty feet was wrecked in several places and traffic over it, except on foot, was made impossible.

A large force of men were hurried to the scene immediately and heavy machinery of the Burlington's ordered from Hannibal.

Des Moines Rising.

It is said that the Des Moines river is rising rapidly. No further damage at the bridge is anticipated and men have the work well in hand. Work of reconstructing the bridge was started about four months ago by the Burlington. In order to accommodate the trains and other traffic temporary structures were erected, the railroad tracks being built upon the pilings which were sunk in the river bed, while a wagon bridge was constructed for other traffic. The bridge span upon this false work is said to be resting on slim support.

CHICAGO, Jan. 27.—Cables three-eighths lower. Wheat sentiment appears to be resting. Recent bearish sentiments galore. Special Wagner report says: Indiana, Tennessee, look fine generally. Weather against upturn. Critics seem to be averse to Canadian farm products. United States farmers asked to compete with the Canadian and yet pay for protection prices in everything they use. Canadians are alarmed by fierce progress of Russia and Argentine outlet in United States. Russia is showing three times as much wheat into the United Kingdom than three years ago. Canadian oats competition would be fatal. The talk will have no effect. There is bound to be a tremendous row over the idea. Despite the continued pounding of coarse grain there is a decline in corn. Oats are bound to be temporary—apparently there is little room for bear raids in the coarse grains and investors and speculators will hang out a buy day notice on all dips.
