—Burlington Hawk-Eye: The statement is making the rounds of the press that the city of Burlington tried to get the encampment of the 54th regiment in 1909 and 1910 but failed. If Burlington made any attempt to get the camp nobody here is aware of that fact. It is recalled, however, that Burlington could have had the camp, that in fact, the members of the other companies would have come here in preference to other places. But there was a hitch right here at home and no effort was made. Years have elapsed since camp was pitched here, but the older men who were in the companies in the eighties and the nineties still recall with genuine pleasure the camps in Burlington and the hospitality and the courtesy shown to them here. As to whether Burlington really wants the camp this year, nothing has been heard. But if she does, no doubt she will get it.

—A meeting was held in St. Louis Tuesday of the trainmen of the Wabash railroad and plans were completed for a new scale of wages for the road, which will take effect in the near future. The Wabash railroad was not represented in the conference of western railroads held in Chicago recently and hence the standard of wages paid by other western companies. The scale of wages paid by the Wabash railroad is about 10 per cent under the scale used by the western roads. The trainmen are only asking that their wages be raised to the standard adopted at the western conference.

—While Uncle Sam has given away empires, he still has a little land left that he raffles off now and then. And he has some that is being held in trust for Indians, and this is usually sold to the highest bidder after having been appraised by trusted officials. Notice of a sale of lands in North and South Dakota was received at the local post-office yesterday. The tracts range from 160 to 820 acres and there are some 15,000 acres in all. The circular states that no bid below the appraised value will be accepted. Bids are to be opened on March 27. The appraised value seems ridiculously low to people living in Iowa and noting occasional transfers of real estate here. The very first piece contains 160 acres and has been appraised at \$10 per acre. The following contains 320 acres. That would mean quite a nice little fortune if it were located in Iowa. But the appraisers say that it is worth \$2,600. There are quarter sections that are appraised as low as \$550. All these lands will be sold for cash. The government has thrown all possible safeguards around these sales. No bid can include more than one tract, but bidders may make separate bids on several tracts if they desire to do so. Under no circumstance will the superintendent, or other officer in charge, or any person connected with an agency office or the Indian service, be permitted to bid or to make or prepare any bid, or to assist any prospective bidder in making a bid. Lands sold in accordance with the provisions of these regulations will be conveyed direct to the purchaser by patent in fee simple from the United States.

TO TAX PAYERS.

City taxes and state and county taxes are now due and must be paid at the same time. (Under the commission form of government the city taxes are collected as all other taxes, by the County Treasurer.)

First half, on both city and county, must be paid by March 21st to avoid penalty.

If first half is paid then the second half may be paid any time before Sept. 30th, without penalty.

If first half is not paid before end of March, then, when being paid, the full amount must be paid with a penalty of one per cent per month added.
