## LOSING MONEY

Assistant Commercial Superintendent E. C. Hall Talks to Business Men of Burlington Yesterday.

Probable That Iowa Telephone Company May Take Over the Home 'Phone Line in Keokuk.

From Burlington reports of yesterday's meeting between officials of the Bell Telephone Co., and business men of that city, the Bell proposes to take over the interests of the Mississippi Valley line there and make an exchange of both, it is stated.

The report reads: The Iowa Telephone Company is a charitable institution. It has lost money on service in Iowa for fifteen years.

The two ring service is an imposition on the public.

The method of raising rates in Burlington has been improperly represented to subscribers.

The Telephone Company objects to being regulated by the city council.

The Iowa Telephone Company will buy up the Mississippi Valley Telephone Company and give one service, if Burlington wishes.

Service in Burlington cost \$18 for many years, was given for \$12.

The four party lines would be discontinued if city would permit, in interest of good service.

It was a mistake to continue \$1 per month service in Burlington.

The above are some of the important points brought out in the discussion of the telephone situation in Burlington today, at which Mr. C. E. Hall of Des Moines, assistant commercial superintendent, had one of the busiest hours of his life answering questions of the business men who have been dissatisfied with the method of conducting the business in Burlington and in the raising of the rates.

Mr. Hall stated that the Iowa Telephone company had secured an option on the Mississippi Valley Telephone company and had already absorbed the exchanges at Wapello, Muscatine and Ft. Madison.

The exchanges at Burlington and Keokuk may be bought at any time. If the people of Burlington desire that the service here be united the company can take over the property and accomplish the same in a few years, making an agreement with Burlington on a schedule of the rates to be controlling for five years.

It was Mr. Hall's statement that the service in Burlington per station is \$18 per year and that on every phone at \$12 a year the company loses \$6 per year. An effort will be made to get rid of all the \$1.00 and \$1.25 per month phones and continue only the \$1.50 and \$2.00 per month phones.

Recently, a new supervisor of the Des Moines county board has brought up the matter of having Lee and Des Moines shoulder the cost share and share alike, or half and half.

It is understood however, that two other members of the Des Moines county board will stand pat when it comes to a vote and will recommend that the cost of maintaining the ferry on the Skunk river still remain the same.

Today at Burlington a meeting of the Lee county and the Des Moines county board of supervisors, was held for the purpose of deciding the question of whether or not Des Moines county, which includes Burlington, shall pay one-half or two-thirds of the cost of maintaining a ferry across the Skunk river which divides the two counties.

In the past it has been customary for Des Moines county to pay two-thirds of this ferry cost because of Burlington getting the benefit of the trade from the farmers living in Lee county who have been "ferried" over to the Des Moines county side and proceeding to Burlington where they have done their buying.

Recently, a new supervisor of the Des Moines county board has brought up the matter of having Lee and Des Moines shoulder the cost share and share alike, or half and half.

It is understood however, that two other members of the Des Moines county board will stand pat when it comes to a vote and will recommend that the cost of maintaining the ferry on the Skunk river still remain the same.

If more attention was paid to feeding and breeding it should be easy to increase the average profit per cow to at least one-tenth of the profit made by Sophie 19th of Hood Farm, which would raise the total to \$1,240,000, an increase of \$44,000,000.
