




PLANT OF DUFFY'S PURE MALT WHISKEY WATERLOO, NEW YORK COVERS 15 ACRES OF GROUND.

## BUTTON MEN'S EDITORIALS

Look-Out Edition of The Button Workers Explains That Unions Were in No Way Responsible.

### WANT THE WOMEN BACK

Employers Making Every Effort to Get Female Workers in Muscatine Button Plants to Return.

In the "Lookout" edition of the Button Worker, a paper published at Muscatine and devoted to the interests of those engaged in the button making business, clearer idea of the situation from the union's standpoint is given. Copies of this little paper have been mailed to many of the unions of this section of the country and some of the reading will no doubt prove of interest.

The Lockout. The button workers employed by the Automatic, McKee & Bliven, Hawkeye, Holmes, Muscatine Pearl, Vienna, Pioneer, Schmalz, Bishop & Hagerman No. 2 and the Smith & Richards button companies have been locked out. This action was taken Saturday evening, February 25 and came like a thunderbolt from a clear sky.

The Button Workers Protective Union is in no way responsible for the present situation. The union never made any demands upon the employers. It never endeavored to injure their business or interfere with the prosperity of the city. Its sole aim was to organize the button workers and then lead up in a gradual and peaceable manner to a mutual understanding with the firms. All along every possible means has been utilized to maintain peace with the employers. That this is a lockout is amply

proven by the numerous attempts that have been made by the representatives of those firms to get their employees, especially the women, to return to work on the condition that they abandon the union. These offers have met with the scorn that they deserve.

The union has but one demand to make, a demand born of the present situation, and that is that all locked out employees be taken back without discrimination. This is our sole demand. A demand that we are forced to make to preserve our organization. No argument, no advice, no pressure that may be brought to bear will change our attitude on this question. We have no desire to see the present situation continue. It is bad for the workers, for the employers and for the city. We are willing to return to work, but we will all go back together or not at all. We have a right to organize and that right we will preserve. This is our position, a position in which we are backed up by the entire organized labor movement of the United States, and we will defend it against all opposition.

What Going Back Means. Let it be understood once and for all just what going back into the shops means before the present difficulty is settled. It means that the employers would hold us in contempt, hammer wages still lower, enforce despotic shop rules and make of us their abject slaves. This is what going back without an understanding relative to discrimination means. So let this be our motto: "Not one man or woman shall return to work and be discriminated against."

A Word From the Men to the Women. We have worked hard to build the union up. We have almost all who work in the industry into it. We have enjoyed ourselves together. We have had our entertainments and dances and we have learned to know each other. We have treated you women right. We will do everything we can to make your lot in life better in the future. Now they tell us you are going back on us by returning to work and make it possible for the firms to break up the union. We do not believe it. We cannot. Do you realize what it would mean for you to return to work? Do you know what it means when the boss asks you to turn in your card and go to work? It means that they are asking you to betray your own people—perhaps your own

father, brother or sweetheart—in order to make it possible to force the men back into the shops to work for a still more miserable existence than heretofore. They love you so well. They think so much of you. They showed how much they thought of you by turning you into the street. Scorn their requests for you to return to work. Remember the coward's refuge is worse than his fear. The traitor's reward is held in contempt by all honorable men and women. Stand by the union and together we will weather every storm and bid defiance to all our enemies.

To Those Who Sew Buttons. All parties who have been sewing buttons for the firms that have locked out their workers are requested to refuse to sew any more buttons till the present difficulty is adjusted. If they don't want us to work for them, they don't need to have their buttons sewed. By quitting, you are assisting the thousands of workers and those dependent upon them, who have been denied the privilege to work and make an honest living.

The Burning Question. You have all heard of the awful things the terrible trade unions do. You have heard how the strikers fight, picket, boycott and raise the devil in general. The employers never tire of speaking of these faults of the trades unionists. The editors and public teachers are every ready to parade these minor features of almost every labor dispute. However, they very conveniently overlook such small things as lockouts for which the employers are responsible. The trades unionists come out and fight in the open. He goes out of the shop and deprives himself of the necessities of life in order that he and his family can have a little more and live a little better. The employer, however, has a more refined way. He simply locks the shop door and slowly starves his victim into submission.

## THE MARKETS

[Gate City Leased Wire Service.] CHICAGO, March 11.—Shorts handled the wheat market today, and when they tried to gather profits and found them meagre, they tried to get their wheat back. At the close of the day prices were close to the day's best and half cent higher than yesterday's close. Corn also showed a slight advance at the close, but oats fell off a fraction. Provisions made a show of going higher, but the demand played out and the close was lower.

News of the wheat situation that came to hand just before the opening was generally encouraging to holders, but certain weak points encouraged the shorts. On the start traders favored the short side, the first transactions being about one-fourth cent off. In less than an hour the market shifted, and previous sellers were furnishing the demand. In a few minutes there was a jump of three-fourth of a cent from the bottom of the decline. Offerings of corn were not heavy at the start but buyers were scarce even at a one-fourth decline. The market averaged strong, with short spells of weakness, and the close was at a slight net advance. The easy tone of the wheat market at the opening was the principal bearish influence.

Corn receipts here were 246 cars, against 236 last year. The oat market, as usual, followed the other grains closely and the early offerings were one-fourth cent decline. The early weakness was only partly overcome by the strength that developed in the corn market, and at the close May and June prices were one-eighth cent off the closing prices of yesterday. Opinion generally favored the buying of provisions, because of the firmness of the hog market. The demand did not continue throughout the day, however, and at the close prices were lower. Liverpool reported an advance of 6d in lard.


