CAN'T EXCITE THE JAPANESE Are Not Worrying About American Soldiers on the Mexican Border.

[Gate City Leased Wire Service.] TOKIO, March 11.—No official cognizance has been taken of the rumors of concessions granted to Japan by the Mexican government, with the mobilization of troops by the United States. Aside from the Hochi, which openly declared that pan-American agrandizement was the actuating spirit in the move, the newspapers have avoided comment on the subject. It is evident, however, that the move is being closely watched by the Japanese government, and with deep interest. For some time past the newspapers have commented on what the completion of the Panama canal would have on the relations between Japan and the United States. The tone of the press on the whole war question has been exceedingly moderate. With newspapers commenting so openly on the possibility of war, it is hardly to be expected that the sudden warlike preparations of the United States should pass without official notice.

Caught in Cave-in. GILBERT, Minn., March 11.—Captain Benny and three miners are entombed tonight 150 feet beneath the surface in the Elbane, just outside this village. Through an iron pipe air is being transmitted to the entombed men and the continued rappings on this pipe encourage the rescuing parties. The men were caught by a cave-in of ore and rock. There was a fifth man in the party but he escaped. It is believed that the men entombed will be able to hold out until rescuers reach them.

GAMBLING JOINT RAIDED TODAY

Night Officers Swooped Down on Wheatley Rooms at One O'clock This Morning Arresting Many.

MORE WARRANTS TODAY

Man by Name of Hartford While in Drunken Condition, Tells the Night Captain of Games in Progress.

Police officers raided the gambling joint of John ("Peg") Wheatley above the Hickey saloon on South Third street, at 1 o'clock this morning.

The attack on the game room was made by the officers shortly after Night Captain Fuqua had talked with William Hartford who was arrested on Third street for being intoxicated. Hartford when placed in jail rebelled bitterly and gave away the gambling game on Third street. Officers Tighe, Brennan and Conn were immediately detailed by the officer in charge to the place and slipped unawares upon the party in the gambling house.

After the men had been placed under arrest, Officers Baldwin and Freeman were called to the station and the patrol wagon taken to the gaming house by Captain Fuqua and return was made in five minutes with five of the arrests.

Those searched and placed in jail on the first count were: James Simons, Sam O'Connell, J. M. Johnson, Fred Erman and James Black. Black claimed to have been rooming on the floor above the gambling joint and when he heard the noise after the arrest came down stairs to look on and was arrested without cause.

Thirty in Room. The officers obtained the names of thirty who were in the rooms at the time of the raid and more arrests will follow today. The move was a sudden swoop and those arrested appeared at the station dazed and stupefied by the sudden attack.

Hartford was given a seance after the first five caught in the rooms were placed behind the bars.

Paraphernalia Confiscated. Shortly after 2 o'clock several wagons loaded of "crap" tables, roulette wheels, card tables, slot machines and a large consignment of other gaming room furnishings were hauled to the police station on a dray wagon and unloaded.

Makes Complaint. Jerry Harrington, ex-assistant city marshal was said by the officers to have been with the party early this morning. When the officers raided the card room, the door leading to an adjoining room in which Harrington and others were, was closed and locked and lights extinguished.

Harrington later protested to the action of the police they say. He was not arrested with other members of the party. More than a score of arrests are expected today as the officers have a list of all who were in the rooms at the time.

CHILD WIFE IS ACQUITTED

Seventeen Year Old Girl is Freed of the Charge of Murdering Student.

[Gate City Leased Wire Service.] WHITEVILLE, N. C., March 11.—Seventeen year old Mrs. Rosa Hayes was today acquitted of the murder of Robert M. Floyd, a medical student of Charleston. Her husband had already been acquitted as accessory. Floyd was slain during a visit to the Hayes home. Mrs. Hayes says he attacked her and her husband shot him dead. The theory of the prosecution was that Hayes was jealous of his wife and forced her to kill Floyd.

Warship is Aground. [Gate City Leased Wire Service.] WASHINGTON, March 11.—In attempting to leave San Diego harbor tonight, the U. S. gunboat Yorktown ran aground at Coronado Beach, according to dispatches received here. The warship is declared to be in no serious danger. The Yorktown had been expected to sail south to join the gunboat Princeton in patrolling the west coast of Mexico.

MEXICAN SCARE IS AS NOTHING

Students of Military Academy Go on Strike And Form Own Government.

[Gate City Leased Wire Service.] BOONVILLE, Mo., March 11.—While awaiting a reply to an ultimatum they have presented to the faculty, eighty-six cadets of Kemper Military academy are camping in military fashion in the hills two miles from this city tonight. The cadets have camped out three nights. They struck when two students were expelled.

The camp is under strict military regulations. This precaution was a result of the desertion or six younger students Friday night.

A provisional form of government has been set up in the camp the senior cadet officer acting as dictator. Negotiations have been opened by wire with the "powers at home" looking to the financing of the revolution.

Meantime an army of parents, guardians and elder brothers is mobilizing in this city, each train bringing additions to the force which is equipped for an indefinite campaign. The ultimatum of the "insurrecto" leaders provides the cadets will return to school on the following conditions: That the senior class be reinstated without prejudice.

That none be compelled to sign a pledge of future conduct.

That none be punished for taking part in the revolt.

That two expelled students be reinstated.
