

ARRAIGN PLAYERS OF THE ROULETTE

Those Charged with Frequenting Gambling House Enter Plea in Superior Court at two O'clock.

CASE MAY GO HIGHER

After City Has Made Disposition of Case, Grand Jury May Have Chance—Will Burn Paraphernalia.

The police served notice on those connected with the gambling room raid of Sunday this morning and at 2 o'clock this afternoon, the defendants were arraigned in that superior court to answer the charge of frequenting a gambling house.

The five arrested and locked up in the city jail Sunday morning early, were released during the Sabbath, each putting up \$25 for appearance bond.

Those to be arraigned today were: Aus Hollowell, Andy McCormick, Jno. Luke, Abe Kriel, Ed. O'Hearn, Melvin Early, James Hillard, James Fickler, John Kelsner, Jeremiah Harrington, William Earle, Jno. Dobbins, Arthur Beknap, Art Kimbrough, Al. Scott, Geo. Paardekooper, "Puss" Leindecker, Bill Berry and Toy Inman.

Those entered on the first count and released on bail Sunday were: James Simon, Sam O'Connell, J. M. Johnson, Fred Erman and James Black. Two charges were entered in the court against James Simon, one of them charging him with unlawfully having charge of 19 South Third street, resorted to for the purpose of gambling.

The paraphernalia itemized and captured by the officers in the raid names the following articles which are contraband and will be ordered destroyed by the court as such, it is presumed: One large crap table, one stud table, one faro bank, one slot machine, one box of poker chips and a large number of playing cards.

Section 294 of the city ordinance provides that this property shall be destroyed. The case against the accused gamblers is one which rests entirely with the city. It is in the power of the state, however, to take it up after the city officials have disposed of it according to their own views and the grand jury, it is reported, may have a shot at it.

Find Dollar and Costs. All of those accused of frequenting the gambling house, charged by Chief Schevers, plead guilty with the exception of Black, Kimbrough and Berry. Black's case is up to the chief, as he claims to have been asleep in a room above the gambling room and went down to witness proceedings.

A fine of one dollar and costs was imposed upon each one pleading guilty. The fine, according to law can be placed from a dollar to \$100, and the minimum with the costs of execution was given by Judge McNamara.

A writ ordering the destruction of the paraphernalia taken from the rooms of the gambling house, was made out, and this according to the police, was the best accomplishment of the raid in an endeavor to break up the gambling habit in Keokuk.

MORTGAGE TO BONDHOLDERS

Trust Deed Given by Mississippi River Power Company to Old Colony Trust Company of Boston.

IS ON PURCHASED LAND

Document Was Filed With Recorder Today and is Voluminous One—First Mortgage on Property.

In the recorder's office here today the Mississippi River Power company, which is building the mile-wide dam across the Mississippi river, gave a trust deed to the Old Colony Trust Company of Boston, Mass., to land which has been purchased along the river and which will be overflowed when the dam is built.

This trust deed represents a first mortgage on the land and is given for the purpose of securing the holders of the five per cent, forty year bonds.

The document is a voluminous one and contains a large number of descriptions.

By a deed filed this morning the Keokuk and Hamilton Water Power Company conveyed to the Mississippi River Power Company a number of described pieces of land recently deeded to it.

In consideration of \$2800 C. P. D. dante of Hamilton has conveyed to Wm. F. Marchefke lot 11, block 49, the property being on Blondeau between Third and Fourth Streets.

ROSE TRIAL WILL BEGIN TOMORROW

Negro Charged With Murder of Chas. Cutright is First One Whose Case is Set for March Term.

COURT CONVENED TODAY

Judge W. S. Withrow is Presiding and Grand Jury, With Henry Reitz as Foreman Was Drawn.

The March term of the district court was convened at two o'clock this afternoon by Judge W. S. Withrow. The term promises to be an interesting one and will be given over to criminal causes as far as possible.

The grand jurors were called. Theodore Hayes was the only juror excused, and from the remaining jurors the following seven were drawn: John Orth, A. J. Hickey, Geo. W. Wadden, Henry Reitz, Geo. Pflegerstoffer, Wm. Smith, G. L. Cochran. These men will constitute the grand jury body for the present term, the others being excused.

General instructions to the body were given by Judge Withrow. He explained that due inquiry should be made into anything brought before them either by a private citizen, the public prosecutor or a magistrate who has bound over an individual.

This inquiry is limited only by the criminal laws of the state. The grand jurors in the investigation have power to compel witnesses to appear if summoned and to testify when called. It is not the grand jury's duty to try cases, but simply to judge if there is reason to believe that the evidence presented warrants conviction by a jury.

When voting on an indictment the record is a general one; the vote of the individual does not become part of the record. It is a great work placed before a grand jury, and thus the utmost secrecy must prevail. Phil Miller has been appointed clerk to the body. Attorney E. C. Weber of Fort Madison and Ed W. McManus of Keokuk will assist the grand jurors in their work.

The case of the State vs. Thomas J. Fichtmaster was passed for the present.

The case of the State against Hewig Rose was announced for trial.

The case of the State vs. Hewitt and Dunbar was announced for trial.

The case of the state vs. Nels Warner was passed.

The case of the State vs. Henry Rose was assigned for Tuesday afternoon with the Anderson case to follow. Rose is charged with killing Charles Cutright near the corner of Thirteenth and Main. The Hewitt-Dunbar case will follow the Anderson case. This is a second trial for the defendants.

No civil cases were set. The appearance docket was called.

HAREMS AND HOBBLES PROHIBITED

Bill Introduced in Illinois Legislature Makes it Unlawful to Wear Them.

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., March 13.—Hobble skirts, which prevent a step longer than a hop, and Harem skirts, which allow a full free stride, fall alike under the ban in a bill introduced in the house. Edward J. Murphy of Chicago is the law maker who has taken up arms against the Syph-like figure that is the Parisian idea of feminine grace and also against the zouave apparel that makes the wearer look like a character from the "Arabian Nights."

Coming down Emerald avenue the other day, Mr. Murphy saw a sight that made him rub his eyes. It was a woman in a bifurcated skirt. A block or two further down, Murphy overtook three women who were progressing with the hippity-hop movement. Murphy rushed home to make an experiment. He draped a tablecloth about his waist and adjusted it until he could walk with ease. Then with a tape line he made measurements. These he made the basis of his bill, which prohibits a woman from appearing in public in a skirt that is less than one and a half yards in circumference at the bottom.

To head off the habit-makers from going to the other extreme and resurrecting the crinoline skirt form, Murphy also provides that no skirt shall be more than three yards in circumference at the bottom. Any woman who dares appear in garb that
