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LET THE PEOPLE OWN UTILITIES

Phil H. Callery Made a Quiet But Telling Speech Before Large Audience Last Night

SOCIALISM ADVOCATES

How the People of the North and South Are Being Skinned by Politicians and Corporations.

Dissatisfactory industrial and political conditions could be easily changed if the voters of today would not take such a complacent view of those situations, was one of the opening remarks of an address characterized by its educational features and made by Phil H. Callery, socialist speaker, in Schouten's hall last night.

An audience of nearly 150, including many women, were present and the speech which embodied both political and municipal questions of the labor and every day world, proved one of the most interesting in recent years.

Mr. Callery, a speaker of the "straight from the shoulder" order does not belong to the class of ranters and his logical statements showed evidence of relish from his attentive listeners.

Too often, the speaker said, the voters of the present, accept conditions as final and say that they cannot be changed. So saying and thinking, they remain so and matters of troublesome turn are the same because of inertia year in and year out. Among the weightier statements for consideration, thrust before his audience, Mr. Callery said: There is no standing still. The nation either moves forward or back. Today's problems must be met intelligently. The voter at the polls should know what he is voting for and not depend on the advice of others.

Education the Main Thing. The broadened minds of school educators would have been enthused with the manner in which Phil Callery handled the problem of education last night.

Better schools are needed lest the children of today who are the men and women of tomorrow because of lack of education develop into degenerates, some of the criminal order. If there is no intellectual force and no learning among the nation's millions today, problems that face us all cannot be met intelligently.

Advocates Municipal Ownership. The socialist party advocates municipal ownership by city, state and nation of public utilities. National ownership, the speaker said, of railroads, telegraph and telephone systems, and other public utilities, is one of the planks in the platform of socialism. A co-operative ownership of industries is advocated by the socialist party.

Milwaukee Handicapped. As an instance of handicapped municipal government, he cited Milwaukee, the socialist city, because when certain measures have been passed and launched for public good, they are interfered with by the state and slanders from the other political parties keeps certain reforms from coming to pass.

Just outside the city of Milwaukee, the city has purchased a tract of 2,000 acres of ground. On this section, cottages are to be erected for the workmen of the locality at cost. These homes are built of concrete and when completed can be had by the workers of Milwaukee for \$800, the actual cost of building.

Thos. A. Edison, the inventor, has given free of any cost to the city, his plans of building these concrete cottages, and no royalty is asked.

Milwaukee government stands for better schools, the establishment of a public play ground and other establishments for the betterment of the growing generations.

In granting saloon licenses, Milwaukee authorities always investigate the character of the man. Because of this, last year twenty-five who wished to secure licenses were refused them. Mr. Callery believes that the state

should be conducted along the same plan of government as a city. In that way it will not interfere with the municipal government of a city.

How Oklahomans Are "Skinned." The speaker showed how the laboring classes of the state of Oklahoma are being cheated by capitalists and owners of corporations each year.

Miners are paid 76 cents per ton for coal mined. They are allowed to work only two days a week. Coal sells from five to ten dollars a ton in that part of the country and yet operators, restricting miners to two working days out of every week, complain of the scarcity of fuel.

Oil sells for 5 and 10 cents a gallon and costs a cent a gallon to refine. Sugar costs a cent to refine. The socialist party in Oklahoma is advocating the municipal ownership of oil and sugar refineries.

Democrats and Republicans Same. The democrats of the south and the republicans of the north are both the same in the promises they make voters and the people before election. After election it is the same old story—corrupt government.

Under the present political system, there is no brotherhood of man and the tooth and claw of the jungle and survival of the fittest is enacted every day.

Back in the time of Christ Callery showed how the Lord worked reforms and was brought before Pilate to be sentenced because of this. The same conditions are seen today, and reforms on the right track are thrown aside or hushed by the political machines in power.

Socialist Party Makes Mistakes. The socialist party makes many mistakes but its mission is to establish a brotherhood of man.

An instance of peonage in the south was dwelt on for several minutes, and the manner of arresting men there and being turned over to the well known "Rucker Farm" was told. When arrested, a man is sentenced to work out his sentence there, which is said to be worse than slave times before the civil war.

A railroad engineer passing through the south without money was arrested. He had a paid up card in the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen's Association, yet he was charged with vagrancy. He was turned over to the "farm." Being sick, he fell over while picking cotton and the overseer of the place and two negroes jumped on the engineer and thrashed him. He died from the effects of the beating.

An investigation of the case is now being made by the government and by the International Trainmen's Brotherhood. The man who died from being beaten, carried \$2,000 insurance in the railroad men's organization.

Rockefeller's Greed for Gold. Up to the time of the civil war, there were one or two millionaires in the country. Today there are hundreds of them.

Rockefeller with his billion dollars is facing a grave of wreck, he doesn't enjoy his food and his whole aim in life is the accumulation of money while others are starving.

Believe in Woman Voting. The socialist party believes in woman suffrage and advocates the voting of women.

The platform of the party is submitted to the rank and file of the country and the entire can be accepted or those parts which are disliked can be cut out.

Education is the main and essential element in the lives of every one is the belief of the party and to that end, the youngest of American political organizations is working.

Close of Meeting. Phil H. Callery was introduced to the audience by Dr. S. M. Gaston and the address was an able one, showing thorough study of the conditions generally the country over. Mr. Callery has traveled through practically all of the southern states and is well acquainted with political, labor and capital situations in that section of the country.

Mr. Callery is sent out by the national socialist committee and no donations are asked from corporations. A collection is taken at each meeting and the free will offering last night was a substantial one.

Fifty subscriptions were secured for the "Pitchfork" a magazine which treats on conditions of the south.
