INDIANS TO CLASH WITH STUDENTS

Battle Will be Put on at Hubinger Park Tomorrow Afternoon, With No Admission for the Public.

ROAD TRIP NEXT WEEK

Two Games Have Been Slated to Follow the Clash at Home With Leland Giants—Mueller Goes Home.

Those bloodthirsty Indians are slated for a go with the purple and white aggregation Saturday afternoon at Hubinger Park. The annual Keokuk-High school game was announced today and the umpire will call play ball at 2:30 o'clock. The battle will be free to the public and the student team promises to have many rooters in the bleachers and grandstand pulling for a close game.

In the past the ante-season games between the Keokuk club and the scholars have been attended by considerable interest, especially when the High school was represented by a nine that made the professionals hustle. Several times the youngsters have come within a narrow margin of clipping the wings of the older opponents. This year the High school club is a good one and an interesting exhibition is promised.

There is a likelihood that First Baseman Mueller will be unable to round into shape for the opening of the season and the Indian dope has again been upset. The big St. Louis boy voluntarily threw up the sponge until he gets into better condition and will go to his home for about a week's rest. Mueller has a very bad ankle which has grown worse since his coming to Keokuk. The injured member is so bad that he can hardly stand on it. He suggested to Belt that he take a rest of a week or more, and this was granted. However, as soon as Mueller feels that he is in shape again he will join the squad. In the meantime Belt will occupy the initial bag with Harper trying out in the position also.

Next week will be a comparatively busy one for the Indians. The week will be launched with a game here on Sunday with the Christian college of Canton, Mo. The battle will start at 2:30 in the afternoon and Belt will rush to the firing line about three of his pitchers.

On Tuesday the Leland Giants of Chicago come and on Wednesday and Thursday the club will be on the road. Wednesday Belt takes his men to Monticello, Mo., and Thursday to Canton for a return game.

Belt will make an effort to weed out his pitching staff during these exhibition games. It has been difficult to arrive at any conclusion during the last ten days, for the reason that little work of a strenuous nature has been indulged in. The weather is very warm today, however, and from now on the staff men will be told to cut them over. None of them has complained to any extent about a sore arm and it looks as though these early difficulties are going to be passed without trouble.

Umpire Bennett has been one of the daily visitors at the ball park since his arrival in Keokuk. He speaks a word or two of praise for the showing of Hilly, who promises to develop into one of Belt's greatest finds. Hilly's work is more promising every day and it is taken for granted that he is a fixture.

It would not surprise the natives if Blue Jacket was handed the honor of tossing the opening game of the season, which will be played here one week from Wednesday. Belt is non-committal, but it is said he has the Indian in mind for the big game. While the recruit catches' look mighty good, it is hard to see anything but Cavanaugh behind the bat in that May 3d battle, also. Cavanaugh is throwing in great style and is at least twenty-five per cent better right now than at any time last season.

RED LIGHTS FOR NIGHT POLICE

Twenty Incandescents of Crimson Color to be Placed on Poles and Operated From the Station.

BETTERS NIGHT WORK

Patrolman After Sundown Can Keep in Touch With What is Wanted Better Than old Way of 'Phoning.

Work on installation of twenty red lights on the levee and in the uptown district will start at once for the completion of the night police patrol light system.

Since last summer, a number of plans which appeared feasible have been carefully gone over and the system which will cost least and give best service it is thought is the red light method. Police Commissioner Gray and Chief Henry Schevers devised this means of keeping in touch with the night officers of the police force.

The lights will be operated by three independent switchboard circuits in the station office and the captain or sergeant at the desk in charge can at all times call a patrolman to the nearest telephone by the simple manipulation of the switch.

Four of the twenty red lights will be placed on the levee "beat" and the others will be placed between Second and Fourteenth on Main street, and at the junctions of alleys between Main and Blondeau and Main and Johnson, north and south of Main. The lights will be placed on poles, at a height of eighteen feet.

Costs Too Much.

To install the regular police alarm and call system the same as is used in cities would cost from \$2,400 to \$5,000. Keokuk has not that much to expend at the present time and the red light system, wiring, incandescents globes and switches will aggregate only about \$400.

The need of some installment or call to get an officer in a hurry at night, has been one of the problems of the police department for some time and the new plan will handle the matter nicely and facilitate the work of the officers fifty per cent at least, it is said. The turning on of the red lights on many of the circuits will let a night patrolman know that he is wanted.

The day officers as well as the night policemen use the telephones along their beats to call in every hour and half hour. Arrangements were made with the Iowa Telephone Company to keep these phones in repair and best order at all times and the patrons have kindly tendered their use to the police department.
