

PUBLIC DANCES ARE SINFUL

Stamp of Disapproval Placed on Them by Very Rev. James W. Gillespie, Pastor of St. Peter's.

ENCOURAGE HOME DANCE

Little Gatherings Arranged by Parents, and Dancing at Private Parties Are Not Sinful.

Placing his stamp of approval on dancing in general, but condemning the public dance hall, Very Rev. James W. Gillespie, pastor of St. Peter's Catholic church, gave a short discourse on the subject Sunday morning, in which he recommended to the parents that they furnish this kind of amusement at home for their children.

Father Gillespie spoke of the sin attached to dancing. He characterized the public dance, in which no invitations are issued and young people are allowed to come of their free will, as sinful, but not the private parties which are open to invited gatherings.

Permissible Dances. "Let us consider briefly the conditions under which young Catholics can dance with both pleasure and propriety. Naturally we think first of the home. The wise mother in planning for her children will provide ample amusement; she will encourage home gatherings, when her boys and girls will assemble their friends under their father's roof for a genuinely good time.

Other Approved Occasions. Each Catholic home is a unit of the parish, and the coming together of these units in the parish reunion or associate dances, under the supervision of the pastor or chaplain, ought to be the ideal public occasion for wholesome recreation. If the dance ends early and groups of neighbors and friends leave together, taking their young people with them there are reasonable safeguards, and small possibility of young couples loitering homeward in the early dawn—a practice that is much more dangerous to morals than the mere act of dancing.


