BASE BALLS WERE STOLEN

Ten Brand New League Spheres Taken From Locker of Manager Frank Belt Last Friday.

NEGROES ON CARPET

Colored Lad by Name of Willie Stewart Working at Belt Place Given Hearing at Station.

The police have rounded up several negro lads who were implicated in the theft of ten dollar-and-a-quarter league baseballs from the locker of Manager Frank Belt of the Keokuk baseball team last Friday.

The discovery that the new "pills" had been "glommed" by someone was made Saturday when the red cartons in which the balls come when newly received, were found scattered all over the floor of the locker room. The officers were at once notified and the first clue obtained yesterday.

Deputy Marshal Pearson caught a colored lad by the name of Johnson trying to sell a ball to a white boy. Johnson claimed at the police station last night that he found the ball in the road.

Benny Pyles, another lad, told the police he got a ball for four cents and six agates used in playing marbles.

Later in the evening when an investigation was being made by Chief Scheyvers of the young colored boys, it was learned that Willie Stewart, another dark lad, had been working for Manager Belt at his home on the Boulevard.

Manager Belt had sent Quincy Moore, a colored attache of the ball park, to the park dressing rooms of the players last Friday with a number of new balls. When leaving the place Moore incidentally mentioned to Stewart that he was going to the park with the balls.

When questioned at the station, young Stewart disclaimed any knowledge of the theft and he and his mother both stated that he, Stewart, had stayed home on Friday night. It was later found that Stewart was out all night and did not get home until five o'clock in the morning.

Stewart later asked if the return of the ball was made, if he would receive his money back for the purchase of them. No quarter was given him, however, and Stewart was to have appeared at the police station this afternoon to square matters.

Manager Belt identified the two balls secured from Johnson yesterday afternoon. The police have all under surveillance who were mixed up in the affair and punishment of the guilty will follow.
