

#### No Violence in Strike.

shop employes on the Monongahela, Allegheny Valley and West Pennsylvania divisions, and a lengthy statement covering the situation up to date from S. C. Long, general manager of the Pennsylvania railroad marked the day's developments.

## IF WE MUST, WE ARE READY

United States Prepared to Fall Onto Mexico Like a Load of Brick at Moment's Notice.

### EVERYTHING IS READY

Invasion Would be Chiefly By Way of Vera Cruz and Transports Are Waiting to Sail.

WASHINGTON, May 6.—"War without quarter until Diaz has been driven from the presidency and out of Mexico," will be waged from now on by the revolutionary forces under Madero, according to an announcement made at the revolutionary junta here tonight. The insurrectionists strenuously insisted that Diaz would be driven into exile within a month.

"Diaz is now the only issue," declared Senor Vasconcelas, who succeeded Dr. Vasquez Gomez as head of the junta. "We are going to drive him out of the country."

"We will borrow \$1,000,000 immediately. A New York syndicate has arranged to lend it and to give us additional money as we need it, taking bonds as security."

"Our forces in the field have also practically doubled since the armistice. Instead of only having merely a revolutionary force about Juarez, we have thousands of armed and trained men all over Mexico. We actually have several thousand men in Mexico City tonight."

Secretary of War Dickson this afternoon declared that the president will do nothing towards intervention without specific authority from congress. Notwithstanding this declaration, no one in Washington for a moment doubts that intervention will promptly follow any considerable loss of American life and property in Mexico. Both the army and the navy are ready.

"If the Mexicans want to have a revolution down there, why let them have it," said Representative Hay, (dem. Va.), chairman of the house committee on military affairs tonight. Hay refused to become excited over the fact that a war, in earnest, was on again in Mexico, and he declared that the "hands off" policy of the United States would continue.

"We have nothing to gain by intervening in the affairs of the Mexicans," he said. "This is their fight, and we should let them fight it out themselves. We have nothing to gain by going into Mexico, and we ought not to involve ourselves unnecessarily."


