## INDIANS POLE WIN IN NINTH FRAME

Belt's Men Could Not Be Stopped by Two Burlington Southpaws, and Rohn Loses Second 5 to 4.

## PFYL WEAKENED IN 5TH

After Going Along Swimmingly he Allowed Four Hits—Error Gave Keokuk Game in Last Inning.

Two Burlington southpaw pitchers could not stop the Indians yesterday's fray and the tables were turned on the Pathfinders, 5 to 4.

The game was anything but brilliant affair. The fielding was of that mediocre variety, and inside ball was far below par. Bell, the first finger used by Rohn, was wild enough to pass three men in the first round and give Keokuk two runs, which proved a stepping stone to the victory that came in the ninth round after Burlington had tied it up in her half. The game was won on Brown's error. Mr. Bell remained intact or rather in the game for just three innings, during which three runs were gathered. He was supplanted by one C. Brown, who seemed to have a great deal but was found for short singles. "Slim" Pfyl looked good during the first four rounds, but in the fifth he was bumped for a quartet of hits, one good for two sacks, and in the inning following he missed things up by issuing a pass to Watson, the first batter up. And again in the ninth they got to the tall boy, this time for a brace of doubles and one run.

**Game a Slow One.**  
The game was a decided contrast to the one on the previous day in point of time. It was dragged through about two hours and fifteen minutes. Umpire Fleming received several vigorous protests during the battle, but they counted for naught.

The two runs in the first inning were a donation. Thanks, Bresnahan, first up, walked and Hilly batted a high fly to the infield in trying to bunt. Clark sprouted out and prospects of a run faded until Connie was able to steal second. Reichle was eager to hit but Bell would not put the base nor the corners, the result being that he also walked.

Painter, the old Iowa league player, was then introduced to Keokuk fans. He presents an imposing figure at the plate and stands up like a real hitter. He looked them over, also and drew a pass. With the sacks full, Ogle hopped one over the pitcher's head which also went over second base and two runs counted. Ogle was caught trying to steal second.

**Clark Hits in Run.**  
Clark hit in a run in the third. Bresnahan got a safe one to center, was sacrificed to second and advanced to third on a passed ball from where he scored on Clark's hit to right. This was the first of three hits made by Clark, his last one going far out into left center for two bases.

During the rounds that Keokuk was scoring Pfyl was having an easy time, but from the fifth on he labored. To start this inning Lowthers hit one to center field and Brown bunted high in an effort to sacrifice. Lamb hit between first and second in such a way that the ball was difficult to handle. It rolled slowly and when Painter picked it up the runner was almost to first. He tried to beat him to the bag, but was late.

C. Brown surprised the multitude by stinging a safe one to center field which Ed. Reichle scooped up and heaved home only to have Cavanaugh drop the ball after he had tagged the runner out at the plate. Ellis doubled to left field. The ball was played to third and Brown was safe, but over-rid the bag and Connie put the ball on him for a live saver. Clifton ended the inning by going out. McCafferty to first.

**Ogle Throws Weakly.**  
Pfyl paved the way to another run for the visitors in the sixth by issuing a pass to Watson. Hilly made an error in covering first on Ross' bunt, missing the throw from Painter, and Watson went to third. From this bag he scored on a fly that went for an outfield sacrifice. The ball dropped in good distance for a throw, but Ogle hopped it in from third base.

Keokuk forged into the lead in the last half of the sixth through Clark's single, an error in centerfield, which made the hit as good as a three-bagger, and Reichle's long fly to the outfield.

The ninth inning was an exciting round, for scores were made on both sides. Burlington tied it up once more through successive doubles by R. Brown and Lamb. It looked like an inning session, but McCafferty
