SAMUELS' PLEA TO BE INSANITY

County Attorney T. A. Craig scoffs at the idea of Such a Defense for Wife Killer.

COURT OPENS MONDAY

A Number of New Causes are on the Criminal Docket—Two Judges Will be Present.

Prosecuting Attorney Theodore A. Craig scoffs at the idea of an insanity plea for Joseph D. Samuels, charged with murder in the first degree, who will be tried during the May term of the district court which opens in Keokuk tomorrow. It is understood that this defense will be made by Attorney W. H. Hartzell for his charge. The county prosecutor says he will allow nothing to stand in the way of a trial and is anxious to have the case come up for hearing as early in the term as possible. It is thought that the case will be reached about June 1 or some time during the second week of the term. After the indictment Samuels' case was passed over one term so that there is little ground for further continuance. Attorney Craig points out that there was never any trace of insanity manifested by the defendant before or even after the murder was committed.

Matthiassen, uttering a forged instrument and for forgery. State vs. Thomas Hayes, on appeal. City of Keokuk vs. Arthur Erickson, appeal from fine for auto speeding. Matthiassen is the man who forged the signature of a Water Power company employe to a pay check, was arrested by Kansas City police after a week's chase by the Pinkerton agency, was then bound over to the grand jury and subsequently escaped from St. Joseph's hospital after an operation for appendicitis.

SALE OF MAIN STREET PROPERTY

Thirty-Eight Foot Frontage Between Fifth and Sixth Sold to E. S. Baker of National Bank.

CHURCH RECTORY SALE

Property at 309 Concert Street Transferred by St. John's to C. H. James—Other Realty News.

Negotiations for the transfer of a piece of Main street property between Fifth and Sixth with a frontage of thirty-eight feet were practically closed Saturday between Mrs. Marie D. Radaach, 1109 Blondeau street, and E. S. Baker, president of the Keokuk National bank. The deeds will not be filed until some time this week. The transfer will include the buildings now rented to Riley Osborn for a barber shop, and to the Adams Express Company. Mr. Baker is buying the property as an investment.

Several other deals for the sale of Main street property are now pending and will likely be closed during the present week. All of the negotiations are an evidence of the faith which many prospective buyers have in Keokuk's future and men with money have reached the stage where they believe investment in Keokuk realty is safe.

St. John's Rectory Sold. The sale of St. John's Episcopal church rectory was also closed Saturday, although the deed has not yet been recorded. The property is at 309 Concert street and has been sold to C. H. James, who has been a renter for five years past. The house is a large one and was purchased by Rev. R. C. McIlwain from Mrs. James F. Cox about six years ago, later being bought by the church. Mr. James will rent out part of the house as an apartment and will also have a part of it as a rooming house.

In consideration of \$500 Anna M. Ringland has conveyed to Mary E. James the rear 37 feet of lots 7 and 8, block 95, the property being on Seventh street between Blondeau and Concert.

THE MARKETS

[Gate City Leased Wire Service.] No Activity Present.

CHICAGO, Ill., May 20.—Activity was not the feature in today's trading in the cereal and provision markets. May wheat closed 3/4 over where it left off the day previous, while July was 1/4 lower. May corn lost 1/2. The decline in oats was from 1/4 to 3/4. A small business was done in provisions at prices a shade lower than yesterday's close.

There were rains throughout a large section of the middle west and that of itself was taken as a reason why wheat should have a further decline. Foreign news was of bearish character also. There was a firmer feeling in the market toward the end. Corn—That greater weakness did not develop was probably due to the belief that much replanting would be necessary, notwithstanding the rainfall.

Feeling in oats came under the influence of the weakness in corn. Provisions—It was an extremely slow day in the provisions market, with the tendency of prices slightly downward.
