

### AVIATION MEET NEXT SATURDAY

Keokuk Offers the People in This Portion of the Valley Their First Opportunity to See the Bird-Man.

### USES CURTISS BIPLANE

Chas. F. Willard Will Operate the Machine and go Through the Varied Evolutions—Military Drill a Feature.

Announcement of Keokuk's big aviation meet to be held next Saturday, May 27, made last evening by The Gate City, has attracted widespread attention not only in this city but in neighboring cities and the surrounding country as well. Keokuk will be the first city in this portion of the Mississippi valley to give the public a chance to see a bird-man in the air and this stroke of enterprise is being widely praised. Thousands are planning to come to Keokuk on Saturday and see this greatest of spectacular performances.

Aviation has attracted wide-spread attention in recent years. Newspapers and magazines have been filled with stories of conquest of the air and wherever opportunity offered vast crowds thronged to see the machines in flight.

The death of a number of the world's leading aviators during the last year has in no sense abated interest in flying, though it has thinned the ranks of the daring men who have risked their lives to conquer the air. Mr. Chas. F. Willard, who will fly at Keokuk Saturday, was a contemporary of some of the men who met death on the exhibition field. His exhibition work shows him no less daring than they, though perhaps more judicious in the handling of his machine.

Flying in a Glen N. Curtiss bi-plane, one of the world's best heavier than air machines, Mr. Willard will give many spectacular stunts on Saturday and in addition will demonstrate the adaptability of the machine to purposes of warfare.

Though a great attraction, the flying machine is not to be the only one on Saturday next. The water power dam is now at a most interesting stage of construction. The first half of the power house coffer-dam is completed and has laid bare ten acres of the rocky bed of the river which is now being blasted out for the foundation of the structure, and work on the dam itself is advancing rapidly. By coming on Saturday, visitors will be able to see the workmen in the act of building this marvel of engineering skill and genius. It is a sight no less interesting than the flying machine and an achievement no less wonderful.

An attractive military feature has also been arranged for with officers and members of the national guard. Arrangements are being made by railroads to handle the crowds of people who will come to this city for the big day. Liberal advertising is being done, and though the time is short in which to let the surrounding states know about the great event it is hoped with co-operation of the people generally to reach even the farthest outlying territory in time to secure a record breaking crowd. ### HOLD-UP MAN IS BUSY MERCHANT

Another Citizen Says he Was Held up in West Keokuk Early Last Night at Fifth and A Streets.

### STORY GETTING THIN

Officers are "Leary" About Some of the Tales Told Them of Highwayman Abroad Here.

"I wish some of these people who say they are held up would have some kind of a mark on them to show that they had been handled by a highway robber," said Chief of Police Schevers this morning on hearing of another reported hold-up last night.

The man with the gun seems to be back at his old game again, relying on recent information of holdups which have occurred in the city during the past month. In three we have there have been four cases of reported highwaymen telling citizens to stand and be searched.

In every instance, not a sign of a hold-up man has been seen by the police upon investigation and in two of the cases, no money was taken from the persons waylaid, although a watch or a good ring happened to be in easy reach of the hold man's fingers.

Told Conductor His Troubles. A man whose name was not learned by the police, told the conductor on the West Keokuk car at 10:30 last night that he had been held up at Fifth and A streets, near the cereal works. The hour was early but the man seemed to tell the street railway employe a story that sounded honest enough. The man held up evidently took the conductor for an officer on account of his uniform and the police believe he thought he had made a report to the proper authorities.

Officer Tighe went to Fifth and A immediately after the car reached Fifth and main and learned about the matter. Investigation of the case showed no prowlers about or a hold-up man in sight. The police believe that some of the hold-ups reported to them have been dreams pure and simple.

### CITY NEWS.

Election of officers will take place at the final meeting of the German Club of the High school to be held Thursday evening. The retiring officers are: Edward Hawkes, president; Heulah Meinhardt, secretary and Leland McArthur, treasurer. Earl Carpenter will preside at the meeting.

Reports to the National Headquarters of the Boy Scouts of America indicate that in the last month thousands of "Tenderfeet" have been taking tests for promotion to second class Scouts. The tests have been held in hundreds of towns, and the demand for second class Scout badges at headquarters indicates the ambition of the "Tenderfeet" to progress in scout activities. The boys have shown their aptitude in tying knots, learning the scout vow, First Aid, signaling, tramping, making a fire without matches, cooking and putting money in bank to qualify as second class Scouts.

### WILL COST STATE A PRETTY SUM

Expense of Calling Out State Militia to Muscatine Will not be Borne by Muscatine County as Supposed.

### WILL COST ABOUT \$10,000

Already Claims to Nearly This Amount Have Been Filed—The Pay Roll is Biggest Item of Expense.

The taxpayers of the state of Iowa must bear the brunt of the expense incident to the calling out of the national guard last month to suppress the disorders at Muscatine, which occurred during the trouble between the button manufacturers at that place and their employes.

Of the five companies ordered out by the governor while the trouble was in progress the state must foot the bills for three and Muscatine county the other two, according to an opinion which has been rendered in the office of the attorney general.

Claims filed thus far with Adjutant General Guy E. Logan for expenses incident to the sojourn of the soldiers indicate that the state treasurer will be called upon to pay in the neighborhood of \$10,000.

### Muscatine's Share.

It was generally understood at the time the troops were ordered out that Muscatine county would be held for the entire expense, and it was for that reason that many of the citizens there objected so strongly to their being retained. Later it was discovered, however, that the county could only be called upon for such expense as was entailed by the local company, which was called out by the sheriff.

The Des Moines company was replaced on the second instance in which troops were ordered to the scene by the Fairfield company on request of the citizens with the understanding that the expenses would be met by the county.

The county's portion of the expense has been arrived at by Adjutant General Logan and a bill rendered for \$1,900, the amount due the state, scarcely 25 per cent of the total expenditure.

The pay rolls for the Davenport, Iowa City and Washington companies, for which the state is responsible, have been forwarded by Adjutant General Logan to the office of the auditor of state, showing a total of \$3,242.52 due the officers and men of the three companies.

The express companies profited by the trouble to the extent of \$101.80, according to the claim filed with the adjutant general, and the Iowa Telephone Co. netted \$33.35 in tolls for conversations held by the governor and adjutant general with the local officers while the trouble was in progress.

### Many Claims to Come.

Claims from the various places where the troops were fed while quartered there have not all arrived, the amount thus vouchered reaching but \$251.99, while it is believed that the total will pass the two thousand dollar mark.

None of the bills of the railway company for transportation of the three companies to Muscatine and return on the two different occasions on which they were called out, has been filed and it is believed that this item will cost the state in the neighborhood of \$1,200.

Other expenses, such as the visit of the governor and the adjutant general and the maintenance of Labor Commissioner Van Duyn there for almost six weeks, is expected to run up another big item in the total which the state will have to pay.

### WORK HORSE PARADE IS POSTPONED

Will Be Held on June 3 Instead of on Decoration Day in Chicago.

CHICAGO, May 23.—Deferring to the wishes of the Grand Army of the Republic and to public sentiment, the Work Horse Parade Association yesterday abandoned its plan for a parade on Memorial day and decided instead to hold it on June 3, the day on which President Taft comes to Chicago to address the Western Economic Society, advocating Canadian reciprocity.

The action was taken following the receipt of official notice from Chief Marshal W. H. Bean of the G. A. R. parade that the proposed compromise of the association that separate streets and times should be used for the two pageants had been rejected by the Grand Army and allied patriotic societies.

The executive committee of the Work Horse Parade Association met in the afternoon in the office of Arthur Meeker, its president, and, after listening to the official statement of the G. A. R. representatives that they would not parade if the work horse procession was held on the same day, voted unanimously to postpone it.
