

GAMBLERS WERE FOUND GUILTY

Of Those Against Whom Informations Were Filed Plead Not Guilty Yesterday Afternoon.

FINED \$50 AND COSTS

Upon Conviction Judge McNamara Issued Order for Destruction of Large Lot of Gambling Utilities.

Fines of \$50 and costs were exacted from six gamblers arraigned in the superior court yesterday afternoon. Judge W. L. McNamara found the half dozen defendants guilty after each had entered a plea of not guilty to the informations charging them with keeping, having charge of and attending places conducted for the purpose of gambling.

Those who paid fines and costs are: George Locke, John A. Wheatley, Walter Hennings, Earl McCowen, known as C. C. Stockey, O. W. Reed and Clarence Kinnaman.

Messrs. Ryan and Downing through some hitch in affairs, did not appear in the court room at the time of the hearing yesterday, remaining in the office of County Attorney Craig until too late. Ryan and Downing were to appear today and enter pleas.

The same charges were preferred against the latter two as the preceding six. Informations were filed by Henry M. Schavers, chief of police, who appeared as state's witness against the gamblers.

No informations were filed against J. F. Salzer and Wm. Noelkemper, their merely being occupants of other parts of the buildings in which the gambling paraphernalia was confiscated in the Wednesday night raid.

Will Make a Big Fire. The three wagon loads of gambling material taken to the front rooms of the city offices the other night will be destroyed probably today or tomorrow, a writ of destruction having been issued by the superior court. The nearly \$2,000 worth of card tables, chuck-luck, roulette and other gambling paraphernalia will be consigned to the axe or the fire route in doing away with the contraband property.

Grand Jury May Investigate. The decision of the superior court does not conclude legal action against the gamblers, necessarily, as the grand jury now in session may investigate the cases and return indictments.

Looks on the Bright Side. One of the gamblers served with a warrant in Wednesday night's raid, looked cheerfully and with a philosophical view at the confiscation of the illegal property in his hands and notice of his fine.

With a laugh this Third street man said, "O this is all right, only there isn't as much fun about these once-in-a-while raids as there is in the two and three times a week calls from the police like we used to have down in Hot Springs."

Two of the witnesses listed in the letter of Attorney General Cosson in his letter to County Attorney Craig, were examined by the grand jury this morning. Other witnesses will be examined soon, that their testimony in the gambling cases may be obtained.

Demise of the elderly lady came at 9:50 after an extended illness of more than three years, caused from a complication of ailments.

Virginia Hopkins was born at Palmyra, Mo., May 15 1844. In 1866 she was married to Americus C. Miller at La Grange. Mr. and Mrs. Miller lived for more than twenty-five years in Memphis Mo., and the deceased spent the greater part of her life at that place. Mr. Miller passed away December 4, 1908.

Mrs. Miller was a woman of Christian bearing and greatly respected by the many who had come to know her. She was a member of the Christian church of La Grange.

To the marriage of A. C. and Virginia Miller, six children were born, the eldest daughter having passed away some time ago. Those surviving are: Mrs. L. W. Vanhyning, Mrs. J. W. Smith, Mrs. T. E. Cather, Mrs. W. A. Hall, daughters, all of Keokuk, and a son, Harry Miller, of Milton, Iowa. All the children were present at the time of their mother's death.

Funeral services are to be held Sunday morning at La Grange, where the body will be taken on that day.

NEW PITCHERS TO WORK HERE

Manager Belt Has Decided to Reserve Smith and Boothby for the Saturday and Sunday Games Here.

MASON IS RELEASED

Catcher is Not Needed by Belt and Will be Cut Loose Unconditionally—Other Late Dope Today.

Saturday and Sunday fans will be introduced to Keokuk's new pitchers, Smith, the man secured from Terre Haute, will work in Saturday's game, and Pitcher Boothby of Dubuque, will make his initial appearance on Sunday.

This was the announcement made by Manager Frank Belt over the long distance phone in talking to Secretary Sterne this afternoon, and at the close of the conversation it was announced that Catcher Mason would be given his release today.

Also the manager denied the story published in the Burlington Hawk-Eye and reproduced on the sporting page today that Catcher Bruggeman has been signed by Keokuk. Belt says that Bruggeman simply wishes to work out with the Indians for ten days without pay. He is in fair shape and if he rounds into form Keokuk may be able to use him. Otherwise he will not be given a contract.

Yesterday Belt said that Smith would likely work today, but he has since changed his mind and Blue Jacket is slated for mound duty this afternoon.

It is said that a shake-up is in sight and changes are expected within the next few days. Tomorrow a conference between Manager Belt and the directors is to be held, it is understood.


