

DEATH MONDAY OF MISS JEWELL

Sarah E. Jewell Who Had Stroke of Paralysis Last Thursday Morning, is Taken Away.

NATIVE OF INDIANA

Came to Keokuk More Than Fifty Years Ago and Was Active Worker in M. E. Church.

Miss Sarah Elizabeth Jewell died at her home, 315 High street, yesterday afternoon at 4:30 o'clock, death being directly the result of a stroke of paralysis which this well known lady had suffered last Thursday morning at 7:30 o'clock.

Sarah Elizabeth Jewell was born March 17, 1843, at Madison, Ind., and when a young miss of twelve years, came to Keokuk to reside in the year 1845.

Miss Jewell had united with the Methodist Episcopal church about fifty years ago and had ever been an active worker in that faith and had lent her assistance to the choir.

Those who survive are two brothers, Messrs. Ben B. and John Jewell of this city; two sisters, Mrs. Harriet E. Hardesty of Keokuk and Mrs. M. A. Graves of Plymouth, Ind. A nephew, Frank J. Hardesty, of Des Moines, and niece, Misses Ida and Nellie Hardesty, of Keokuk, and Mrs. Laura Huttenlocher, and nephew Frank J. Hardesty, Jr., of Des Moines, and an aunt, Mrs. Laura Sovereign, who resides with the family in this city, are among the bereaved relatives.

Funeral services are to be held tomorrow afternoon at 4 o'clock from the late residence.

FRANK WEBSTER IS DECEASED

Death This Morning of Keokuk Citizen Who Has Been Here a Year.

This morning at 6:30 o'clock occurred the death of Frank Webster at the family residence, 408 Palean street. Mr. Webster's death was caused from inflammation of the bowels and he had been ill for the past four days, having been confined to his bed from the ailment which caused his passing.

Born in the state of New York, Frank Webster had come west many years ago and had made his residence in Ft. Madison for an indeterminate period and came to Keokuk about a year ago.

The deceased had been employed at light labor because of his advancing years, being 59 years old at the time of death.

A member of no secret fraternity nor church, Mr. Webster was a good citizen, a man whose interests were centered in the home in which he lived and his care for those dependent on him was always thoughtful and his nature to others generous.

Those who survive are his wife, Mrs. Nancy Webster, a daughter Maud, and son Claud, of this city, also a stepson, William Allen, of this city. One grandchild, Vivian Hazel, child of Mr. Webster's daughter, survives.

Funeral arrangements have not yet been made.

FIFTEEN YEARS OF SILENCE

James Grant Wilson and Daughter Have Not Spoken to Each Other.

NEW YORK, June 20.—Even the subtle influence of Cupid will not serve to break the silence of fifteen years that has existed between James Grant Wilson, author, diplomat and a veteran of two wars, and his 40 year old daughter, Mary Margaret Kirkpatrick Wilson, who, within a few days will become the bride of Franklin Sylvester Henry, 60, a retired business man of Cleveland. Mr. Wilson is 81. He said that since a difference of opinion fifteen years ago, and a broadening of the breach four years ago when he married the widow of Rear Admiral Nicholson, he has not spoken to his daughter.

"I do not know the man my daughter will marry," said Mr. Wilson. "I shall not attend the ceremony. I have not been invited. I will neither deny nor affirm that the original estrangement was the result of my refusal of permission for her to marry the man of her choice."



LEE COUNTY GOOD ROADS

Meeting Was Held in Fort Madison For Purpose of Determining On the Proposition.

ROUTE OF BLUE GRASS

President J. L. Long Will Decide Today How the Road Through Lee County Should Go.

FORT MADISON, June 20.—A monster good roads meeting was held at the Commercial club rooms in this city last evening, it being called especially for the purpose of determining the route of the Blue Grass road through Lee county. Two propositions were presented, one by Westpoint and the other by Denmark, each of whom were anxious to be located on the road.

No decision was reached, but President Long will decide today how the road through Lee county shall go. There was some discussion as to whether it should go through Salem.

BRAZILIANS WILL SEE CORONATION

Arrive in London to View the Coronation and Spend Money Most Recklessly.

LONDON, June 20.—All of the international delegations who will participate in the coronation festivities reached this city by Monday morning. The decorations are complete and everything is in readiness for what is expected to prove the most elaborate ceremony in the history of the British empire.

The only hitch in the program has been in the welcoming of the official guests. Despite the large number of troops mobilized here the military authorities have been distracted by the necessity of providing the suitable escorts and guards.

One thing much in evidence is the small number of Americans in the city. It had been expected that many of the foreign visitors would come from the United States but the action of the hotel people in jumping their rates sent the people to the continent instead of to this city. One big hotel is filled with residents of Buenos Ayres and the manner in which they are spending their money has been a revelation to the Britishers, used as they are to American spendthrifts.

An entire regiment of the king's guardsmen, crack troops of the empire, went on duty last night as guards of honor to the foreigners. None was overlooked. Even John Hays Hammond, the special representative of the United States, has a corporal and three big guardsmen at his beck and call. An armed guard is on duty on the steps of his Stratton street residence and all who enter are halted and compelled to explain their mission before being permitted to the presence of the American mining millionaire.

One Bandit Killed. YOUNGSTOWN, O., June 20.—Highwaymen, while trying to rob laborers who were paid at the new reservoir, engaged in a bloody battle in which one man, as yet unidentified, was killed and two others wounded. The bandits escaped with the pay envelopes of several of the laborers.

Entertained on Battleship. CRONSTADT, Russia, June 20.—High officials of the Russian navy, the German Ambassador and leading members of the foreign colony here were entertained by Admiral Badger on the American flagship Kansas.

DES MOINES, June 20.—As the result of a special election held here, the city council is given the right to purchase or build a water works plant in Des Moines. The vote stood practically 3 to 1 in favor of the measure. Of the 4,252 votes cast 1,266 were by women.

FIRECRACKER STARTED FIRE

Careless Fort Madison Lads Set English Lutheran Church Ablaze.

FORT MADISON, Iowa, June 20.—A few firecrackers, carelessly thrown into the air by some over-patriotic lads, happened to fall upon the roof of the English Lutheran church, and, starting a small blaze and a large smoke among a few shingles, caused a fire alarm to be turned in about 4:30 o'clock yesterday afternoon. The report quickly spread that the church was on fire and several hundred soon gathered near the edifice. A couple of boys, a ladder and a bucket of water put out the blaze.

Mother Was Murdered.

NEW YORK, June 20.—Running in to his mother's room to tell her he had completed a job, all talk given him five minutes before, twelve year old Peter Morando found his parent with her skull split, and feet and hands bound, lying dead on the bed. Both ear lobes were torn where diamond earrings had been brutally pulled out, supposedly by two men who had followed her home from a store two doors away where she had displayed a sum of money. The police are without a clue to the murderers.

Hayner Will Return.

MACON, Mo., June 20.—Mrs. Lon Hayner, wife of the missing cashier of the Citizens' Bank of Macon, declares her husband, broken in health by the mental strain, will return to face the entangled situation that caused the bank to be closed Saturday by the state banking commissioner. Developments indicate that Hayner figured in the bank's trouble only because he made loans without sufficient security.

Cigar Stores Vacant.

CHICAGO, June 20.—Seven new stores of the United Cigar Stores Co., which were to have been opened in Chicago, have been ordered closed and it is probable they will never be opened. A similar condition is said to prevail in all parts of the country. Leases have been signed on the Chicago stores and the trust will be compelled to pay rent but will go no further toward opening the stores. The determination not to open these new places follows the supreme court decision in the tobacco case.

MOTHER-IN-LAW FOR HIRE

Real One Demanded Carriage, So Groom Rented Another and Got Himself Into Trouble.

In Marseilles the hire of a mother-in-law for a few hours is quoted at an exorbitant price, which seems quite cheap. The parents of one of a future happy pair were separated. When asked to the wedding to give her consent, the future mother-in-law said: "I will go if a carriage is sent to fetch me; if not, I will stay at home." The carriage was promised, but the day and the hour came, and the carriage did not, and the future mother-in-law stayed at home. "Very well," said the bridegroom-to-be, when she saw that she was not turning up. "I will find another mother-in-law." So he went out into the street and found one for one shilling eight pence. She came to the wedding and duly gave away her daughter, whom she had never in her life seen before, and the bridegroom and bride were made one.

But they let themselves in for more than they bargained for. A complaint has been lodged and the bride, bridegroom and witnesses are liable to severe penalties for procuring, aiding and abetting, impersonation, forgery in a public deed, and other crimes, while it seems likely that the marriage in French law is null and void, the consent of one of the parents having been given by a sham mother. The one shilling eight pence hired mother-in-law is being looked for by the police.—London Telegraph.
