

PATRIOTIC AND RELIGIOUS SERVICES AT ST. MARY'S

Estimated That More Than 2,000 Persons Saw Laying of Corner Stone of New Church Yesterday Afternoon at 2:30

PROMINENT PERSONAGES WERE PRESENT

Thirteen Catholic Clergymen, City Officials and Men of Construction Renown, Assist With Exercises.

Combination of the elements, enthusiastic patriotism and religious pride have caused the laying of St. Mary's new church corner stone to be one of grand memories.

Father Foley, Principle Speaker. Father Foley of Quincy, the principle speaker of the afternoon, told of the work that is being done the world over by the Catholic church and especially in America, for civilization, religion and country.

Father Vincent Hellstern of Warsaw was announced as the "German speaker" but in delivering his several witty remarks, Father Hellstern spoke English.

Large Pageant to Church. Owing to the intense heat of the afternoon, many members of the society did not participate in the street parade which had its start from the Knights of Columbus hall, Fifth and Main streets.

In the line of march were four marshals riding, platoon of police officers, Citizen's band, automobiles carrying the mayor, commissioners, Judge Bank, Hugh L. Cooper, C. R. Joy, L. H. G. Bouscaren, and Dr. S. W. Moorehead.

The degree team of the A. O. H. lodge acted as an escort to the Rt. Rev. M. Flavin, prote notary apostolic of Des Moines, the clergyman who laid the corner stone of St. Mary's church.

Hon. F. H. Wilken of Fort Madison in his remarks, said that Father Giglinger had chosen a date for the laying of the new church corner stone, that was one of historic prominence, especially for this section.

Hugh L. Cooper Talks. In announcing Hugh L. Cooper, chief engineer of the Keokuk and Hamilton Water Power company, as the concluding speaker of the day, Father Giglinger remarked that when he had asked Mr. Cooper to assist with the exercises, he had told him that he would be limited to fifteen seconds.

Father Flavin Speaks. After the laying of the corner stone, Father Flavin, of the Des Moines Apostolic order, addressed the people in well chosen words, congratulating the citizens on their general appreciation and good will and spirit manifested on the occasion.

Next Monday afternoon at half past two, Prof. C. E. Warburton will give two, from the center of the Keokuk and Hamilton bridge. The feat will be given under the direction of Keokuk business men and will no doubt attract a large crowd.

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START CHANGING THE Q TRACKS

Work of Putting in Side Track for Main Line at First Lock Commenced This Morning.

WOODIN IS HERE READY

Fill Will Be Made After Present Tracks Are Taken Up, Dirt to Be Scraped From Along Bluff.

W. W. Woodin, roadmaster of the Hannibal division of the C. B. & Q. railroad, arrived here this morning to personally superintend the preliminary work of changing the main line of the Burlington's tracks north of the city.

The rail crew started today the building of a track on the canal side of the present bed location, which will be sixteen hundred feet in length. When this track has been built, the old rails will be taken up and a "fill" made, the new tracks will be constructed.

Dirt for the fill which will be made will be taken from the bluff. Today's work was the first actual construction change made since the surveyors and engineers completed their work of mapping the new road bed, several months ago.

SHORT MARATHON RUN IN MUD

Erleben Wins Eleven Mile Sprint in One Hour and Little Over.

ST. LOUIS, Mo., June 26.—Joe Erleben, proved too strong in the short marathon for Sidney Hatch, of Chicago, when Erleben won the Missouri A. C. modified marathon. The distance was 11 miles. Time 1 hour, 7 minutes, 35 1/2 seconds.

Hatch was 200 yards behind. Joe Foreshaw was third. Seventy-five runners started. Hatch recently defeated Erleben, winning the twenty-six mile Missouri A. C. marathon. Occasional showers throughout the day made the road course muddy.

Propagating False News.

LISBON, via Badajoz, June 26.—Having abolished the press and telegraph censorship, the Portuguese government has invented a new offense to take its place—that of "propagating false news." Offensive news messages, filed at any of the government telegraph offices are not now, as they used to be, refused transmission under the censorship law. They are held up, however, as "injurious to the public welfare." The senders are at the same time arrested for "propagating false news," and either held indefinitely in prison or expelled from Portugal.
