—Sherwood repairs harness.  
—There will be services in Melrose M. E. church next Sunday. Dr. Henry B. Barnes of Keokuk will preach.

—There will be no sessions of the Chicago board of trade Monday or Tuesday. Usual business sessions after the Fourth of July.

—The trip of the steamer Keokuk will be reversed next Tuesday, the boat running from Quincy to this city to accommodate intermediate points and Quincy dam seers. The boat will leave Quincy at 8 o'clock in the morning and arrive about noon.

In an action of this kind the clerk of the district court is compelled to certify to the supreme court all the records in the case and a speedy hearing will no doubt be given the matter by that body.

Four dioceses are necessary for an archbishopric and with the Davenport diocese divided with Des Moines a separate division, there would be the necessary number. To create an archbishopric at Omaha, that diocese would be divided. A communication has been sent to the apostolic delegate at Washington asking if a petition to Rome for this purpose would be in order.
