

# KIDNAPS HER OWN CHILD BY MEANS OF AN AUTOMOBILE

### Mrs. Alice Hootz, Former Wife of Henry Sanders, Spirited Young Girl Away From Nauvoo Academy Saturday Afternoon

## POLICE HAVE INSTIGATED WIDE SEARCH

### It is Believed Mother Has Gone to Davenport, Where She Will Remain in Hiding—Henry Sanders Thoroughly Aroused.

Kidnapping her own child, who was being schooled at the Nauvoo academy under jurisdiction of court, Mrs. Alice Hootz, divorced wife of Henry Sanders, proprietor of the Grand Hotel, is the object of a state-wide hunt that has been instigated by the Keokuk police and the prosecuting attorney's office.

Using an automobile to aid her in spiriting the six-year-old child away, the abduction at an early hour Saturday afternoon was accomplished in a most sensational manner. Racing from Nauvoo at the rate of forty miles an hour, Mrs. Sanders and her confederates are reported to have reached Fort Madison in time to board the K-line train going north, and it believed the woman is now hidden in Davenport, the city in which she has been residing for the past year.

Immediately after the alarm had been spread the sisters at the academy notified Keokuk authorities and steps were taken to effect a capture. Late Saturday evening Attorney E. W. McManus of the county attorney's office wired the chief of police at Davenport. Efforts in other directions have also been made to apprehend the woman. Preparations have been made to have a writ of attachment issued.

Mr. and Mrs. Sanders were divorced from each other on July 7 of last year. By a decree granted in the district court here the custody of the child—Marie, aged six—remained an open one and until settled it was agreed that the child should be schooled at Nauvoo, the expense to be met by the father and court to have jurisdiction.

Mrs. Hootz is said to have arrived in Nauvoo during the morning. She went to the convent and conferred with the superior sister, learning that the child had its room in a small cottage on the grounds. Going there and making false representations, according to the story of the police, Mrs. Hootz spirited the child from the house, rushed to an automobile awaiting in the business district and was whirled from the place, going north to Fort Madison. The police have no reason to suspect the identity of the parties who assisted the woman.

Henry Sanders has urged the police to make every effort to locate his former wife and states that he wants the child returned. While in Davenport Mrs. Sanders has been living at the Arcades flats and the police there have been told regarding this.

## TOOK SAMUELS TO PENITENTIARY

### Wife Murderer Looked Behind Bars at Fort Madison to Remain There During His Entire Life.

## TAKEN IN AUTOMOBILE

### Whirled to Prison Late Saturday Afternoon, After Judge Hamilton Has Refused New Trial.

Joseph Samuels, wife murderer, was whirled away to the Fort Madison penitentiary within less than five hours after Judge W. S. Hamilton had denied a new trial in the case. Samuels, as glib as ever, made the journey in an automobile in custody of Sheriff John J. Crimmins and a bailiff. Late in the afternoon the penitentiary doors closed behind him and Samuels began serving a sentence that will not expire until death claims him.

Samuels appeared in court Saturday morning to hear Judge Hamilton pass sentence upon him. Court briefly reviewed the crime, stating that it was a heinous one, and particularly because the victim was his wife and mother of his children. Judge Hamilton said the crime was one which the law must punish with severity, although God was the only one who could adequately punish it justly. The arguments by the attorneys were made yesterday afternoon.

## STRENGTH OF THE NEW-BORN

### Muscles of the Forearm Especially Seem to Be Powerful, Says a London Periodical.

The myth of the infant Hercules, who strangled two serpents in his cradle, may not have been a myth at all, but a fact, says the London Telegraph. Modern science has proved that it is quite a possible feat. The new-born babe is relatively much stronger than a full-grown man, according to the result of medical tests: "The muscles of the forearm are surprisingly vigorous. A few hours after birth a baby suspended by its finger to a stick, or to the finger of a person, can hold itself in the air for ten seconds, and, in the case of particularly strong infants, for as long as half a minute. At four days old the child's strength has increased, and the time is two and a half minutes for 98 per cent. of babies. The maximum is attained at a fortnight. Few infants can hang on for more than one and a half minutes, though one exceptional young Hercules remained suspended for two minutes and 38 seconds by his right hand. After that he still hung on with his left for 15 seconds longer." It is not stated whose babies were put through these horizontal bar gymnastics at the early age of from one hour to a fortnight.

## Strict Scottish Sabbath.

Looking out of the window used to be an indictable offense on the Sabbath. In 1709 the kirk session of Edinburgh, "taking into consideration that the Lord's day is profaned by the people standing in the streets, vaguing in the fields and gardens, as also by idly gazing out of the windows, it is ordered that each session take its turn to watch the streets on the Sabbath, and to visit each suspected house in each parish by elders and deacons with beadle and officers, and after sermon, when the day is long, to pass through the streets, and to remove such as transgress and inform on such as do not refrain."

## WOMAN CAUSE OF THE CRASH

### Louis Orffan, the Greek Peanut Vendor Had His Wagon and Head Broken By Brick Last Night.

## M'CLURE THE ASSAILANT

### Two Men Had Been Paying Attention to Same Woman and One Says She Was Cause of Disturbance.

Crashing through the glass window in his big red popcorn wagon like a bomb, a half brick struck Louis Orffan, the Greek peanut vendor, in the head, while his refreshment vehicle was standing near Dodge's theatre last night, and cut a scalp wound in Louis's head that bled profusely for a time.

The missile, thrown with great force, came from the hand of Chester McClure who came up Fourth street, crossed over to where the peanut wagon was standing and sent the brick bat portion sailing through the glass.

Orffan, known in town to every one as "Pop Corn Louie," went immediately to the police station after bandaging up his injured head and filed an information against McClure. The police were called to the scene of the trouble, but the offender had made his escape.

## Trouble Over Woman.

A woman by the name of Mrs. Bell is said by Orffan to have been the cause of McClure's throwing the brick through the pop corn wagon. Both men have been paying attention to her and McClure evidently becoming jealous, thought to inflict injury on his rival. Louie is known as a quiet, peaceful citizen, but was enraged at the treatment he received from the young white fellow last night.

## Warrant for McClure.

Judge W. L. McNamara issued a warrant for the arrest of McClure at 11 o'clock last night and the officers made a search for Orffan's enemy. It was supposed that McClure would either be at the home of a man by the name of Arthur Head, between Third and Fourth on Exchange street, or at the home of the Bell woman, but he could not be found at either.

## Lydia Gets the Credit.

It is Lydia that we owe the invention of coinage. In all times and in all countries, the privilege of coining has been allowed the sovereign. Croesus of Lydia was the first monarch to introduce a bimetallic system of coinage—gold and silver in the proportion of about three to four. This was some time between 560 and 546 B. C.

Metal was chosen, doubtless, by reason of its durability and in the case of gold and silver, by reason of their intrinsic value. Silver and brass were first used, particularly in Greece, from a lack of sufficient gold. Later, however, this definitely was overcome.

The less liable a metal is to change in value, the better it is suited for a standard.

The Greeks first issued real coin some time during the seventh century B. C. By the fourth century the entire civilized world used money.—Scientific American.

The founder of a new aristocracy is Sir Almoth Wright, and the washed are to be submerged by the unwashed; the cleanly few representing an old system are to fall before the oncoming black horde.

"As to washing," Sir Almoth says, "there is a belief that by doing so, people wash off the microbes.
