CITY NEWS.

—Go to Fort Madison on the steamer Sidney July 22d.

—Born, to Mr. and Mrs. C. G. Langston, July 16, a seven pound boy. Both mother and child doing nicely. Mrs. Langston was formerly Miss Mae Bonham.

—Governor Chase S. Osborn of Michigan, has joined the throng of governors who are behind the Boy Scout Movement. He recently assured Milton A. McRae, second vice-president in Boy Scouts of America, of his interest in scout activities. He has visited Boy Scout Troop in St. Clair, Detroit, and several other points in Michigan and has talked to the boys on patriotism, character-building and shown much enthusiasm in the Scout stunts which the boys are doing.

—In 1855 Warsaw contained three flour mills, two steam saw mills, one mill and distillery and a brewery. Those were good business days, say the old timers, but it took sixty hours to get mail from Chicago and in winter time twenty days. During that year Warsaw shipped 42,100 bushels of wheat at average value of \$1.20 per bushel; flour, 10,764 barrels; average price, \$7.00 per barrel; oats, 60,000 bushels; average price 28c; corn, 26,200 bushels, average price 50c; hay, 2,250 bales, average, \$3 per bale; whiskey, 7,836 barrels, average, \$10 per barrel; hogs slaughtered within the county and shipped from that point, 12,000; value \$120,000. Number slaughtered during past winter, to be shipped during summer, 16,500.

—Fort Madison Democrat: It was expected that the Bowen-Sallander-Degan biplane would be given a trial flight Monday afternoon and it was only a slight mechanical hitch that prevented. At 4:30 o'clock the machine was run out of its hangar on the Frank Hughes farm, attached to a stake and the engine given several trials as to pulling power. During these trials it was discovered that the gasoline and spark control apparatus would not hold itself in place automatically as it should. To make a flight under such conditions would require the aviator to use one hand all during the flight to keep the controlling lever in place. As the aviator needs both hands—and sometimes more—for other purposes when flying, the flight was, of course, deferred until the defective apparatus is replaced. Just when this will be is not known, though two or three days may elapse before a flight is made.
